

## Solemn Requiems Offered For 2 St. Joseph Sisters

Funeral services for two Sisters of Saint Joseph, Sister Camilla and Sister Hilda Marie were held this week at Nazareth Convent, Pittsford.

On Tuesday, Right Reverend Monsignor George V. Predmore celebrated Solemn Requiem Mass for Sister Hilda Marie, a teacher at Holy Apostles School, who had been ill three weeks. He was assisted by Rev. John E. Roach as Deacon and Rev. Joseph P. Brennan as Sub-deacon. Altar boys from Holy Apostles parish served the Mass.

Also present in the sanctuary were Monsignors John M. Duffy, Dennis W. Hickey, and Reverend Fathers E. Joseph Esser, Leo V. Smith, William H. Shannon and Frederick W. Bush.

A delegation from the Rosary Society of Holy Apostles parish and from the Mothers Club attended the funeral, also the pupils from Sister Hilda Marie's classroom. They formed a guard of honor at the convent and at the cemetery.

The last blessing at the grave was given by Monsignor Predmore.

**SISTER HILDA MARIE** entered the Sisters of Saint Joseph from Dansville in 1907. She was a teacher at St. Mary's Boys' Home for 13 years and taught at several parochial schools in the diocese including St. Francis Xavier, Corpus Christi, St. John's, and St. Francis de Sales, Geneva. She was principal of St. Hyacinth's School, Auburn, and St. Theodore's, Gates.

Surviving Sister Hilda Marie are three sisters: Mrs. G. Scott, Mrs. Richmond, and Mrs. Leo Tydings.

Sister Camilla entered the Sisters of Saint Joseph in 1891 from Old St. Mary's Parish. From 1902 she was principal and teacher and in the old Cathedral Grammar School. Before her assignment to Nazareth Hall, she was principal of Holy Apostles School. Illness forced her retirement to Nazareth Convent Infirmary in 1952.

Sister Camilla is survived by a niece, Miss Marie Faulkner, both of Rochester; also several nephews in distant cities.

## Sisters Drive For Funds Nears Close

Second and final reports in the Sisters of Mercy financial need appeal are scheduled Monday and Thursday nights, Jan. 27 and Jan. 30, in Our Lady of Mercy Auditorium, 1137 Blossom Rd.

More than 600 men and women are seeking pledges from friends of the Sisters in Monroe County toward construction of a \$1,250,000 building for the Sisters' teacher training college.

General solicitation is being conducted among Mercy high alumnae, parents of present students, members of the Mercy Guild, and friends of the Sisters. Committee heads pointed out that neither could be nor was intended to be all inclusive.

**HEADING THE** general committee are Monsignor J. Coleman and Mrs. Walter B. Hickey, special gifts solicitation is under a group headed by E. M. Tobin, chairman of the general committee.

At the first fundraising meeting Monday, Coleman and Kearney headed the support and appeal by business and industry. It evidences widespread appreciation of the need for the teachers and of the value to the community of sister teachers, they declared.

He also served a term as president of the Laymen's Retreat League.

He was a pioneer member of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society when that group was organized in 1929. He later aided in expanding this program to other cities of the Diocese and in the Buffalo and Syracuse dioceses.

Mr. Tucker operated his religious goods store, now located at 300 Main St. East, for 25 years.

Prior to operating the store he worked in the advertising department of Hickey Freeman Co. and Shuron Optical Co.

He taught English at Aquinas Institute from 1922 to 1926 and was a part time instructor in business administration at St. John Fisher College 1956 to 1957.

He was in Dorchester, Mass. Mr. Tucker came to Rochester in 1922 following his graduation from Boston College.

**TWO OF HIS** six children are in religious orders. A son, Thomas, is Frater M. Charles, O.C.S.O. of the Trappist Abbey of Mount Airy and a daughter, Sister Mary Laboure of the Mercy Hospital School, Greece. Another son, Gerard, is registrar at St. John Fisher College.

Mr. Tucker is also survived by his wife, Gertrude S.; sons Charles J. of El Cajon, Calif., and James E. of Rochester; daughter Patricia, nine grandchildren; a brother, John, of Rochester, and a sister, Mrs. George D. Haas, also of Rochester, and several nieces and nephews.

His home was at 459 Brookview Dr., Irondequoit.

**THE HOLY FATHER** RECENTLY made a most startling statement: "One missionary accompanied by six catechists does more good than seven missionaries, because the catechists work among their own people, know their language and their customs, and make contacts more readily than a missionary coming from another country."

**BY CATECHISTS** THE HOLY FATHER MEANT lay apostles, men and women, who teach religion and prepare the converts for instruction. Naturally, in Africa, Asia and elsewhere natives have to be trained in this apostolate before they engage in the actual work of conversion. Asia and Africa together have a population of 1,500,000,000. There are only 25,000 priests in these areas. This shortage of priests is made up by 76,000 catechists who can support themselves on as little as \$30 a month.

**WHY WAS THE UNITED STATES**, with its thousands and thousands of Catholic College graduates, no highly organized catechetical movement to instruct the lost sheep? Priests average less than three converts per priest per year. We may lose that many through bad marriages, pride, lust and avarice. The holy could and should supply an army of catechists to rescue religion in our land from the darkness of despair and return it to the Light of the World and that Peace which the world cannot give.

**THE LAY, IN GRATITUDE** FOR their faith, should make sacrifices to bring the faith to pagans in foreign missions. Some could send in every month sufficient to keep a catechist in Asia or Africa. Others could sacrifice enough in a year to have a little missionary of their own saving souls. Judgment Day will not be fearsome if now we make friends with the Judge Who is Christ the Lord.

**ANY SACRIFICE** you make, large or small, for catechists will be sent directly to the Holy Father who will make the distribution. This always happens when you give to his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Give your soul a treat by denying your body a few little treats each day.
