Papal Honor Given Cathedral Sexton

Worms, Germany — The sexton of the cathedral here was honored on the occasion of his 75th birthday with a papal honor.

Philipp Kuhn, who has been sexton and pastor of the Worms Cathedral for more than 70 years, received the papal medal "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" from His Holiness, Pope Pius XII. Once when the Pope was Apostolic Nuncio in Germany, Mr. Kuhn had a conversation with the pontiff. The Pope never forgot the courtesy and humility of the sexton.

Mr. Kuhn is believed to be the first citizen of Worms to receive this papal honor.

Jews Hit Public Religious Symbols

St. Paul, Minn. (RNS) — The Minnesota Jewish Council is planning to distribute 500 copies of a memorandum warning against "illegal displays" of religious symbols on public property in the state.

Samuel I. Scheiner, executive director of the council, said copies would be sent to city attorneys, church organizations, junior chambers of commerce and school superintendents.

As illustrations of the problem locally, Mr. Scheiner cited the following religious displays that have been or will be placed on public property in the state of the Eagles fraternal order; crosses at the Como park floral gardens in St. Paul and at the St. Paul courthouse.

The memorandum to be distributed was prepared by the commission on law and social action of the American Jewish Congress.
