

Bishop To Present Candles At Sodality Feast Celebration

Fifth annual observance of the Feast of the Purification will be held by the Sodalities of the diocese on Monday, February 3. The diocesan-wide celebration will be highlighted by the Solemn Mass at St. Michael's Church, Rochester at 7:45 p.m.

Auburn, Corning, and Elmira will also have ceremonies marking the Feast.

IN ROCHESTER, His Excellency Bishop Kearney will distribute candles to the representatives of the various parish and school Sodality groups. The Bishop will preside at Solemn Mass and preach the sermon.

Assisting Bishop Kearney will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, chancellor, as assistant priest; Rt. Rev. Msgr. Richard Burns, pastor of St. Thomas Church; and Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles Boyle, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools, as deacons of honor.

The Rev. Edward McAniff will be master of ceremonies for the Bishop.

Celebrant of the Mass will be the Rev. Edward E. Steinkirchner, Diocesan Director of Parish Sodalities; deacon will be the Rev. John W. LeVeque, Sodality Director of St. Agnes High School; subdeacon will be the Rev. Richard Hart, Sodality Director at the Church of the Assumption, Fairport.

The Rev. James Marvin Assistant Director of Parish Sodalities will be master of ceremonies. The minor offices will be filled by sodalists of St. Boniface and St. Michael Parishes.

The choir will be made up of the Glee Club of Our Lady of Mercy High School under the direction of Sister M. Margaret. Mrs. Lillian Karnes will be at the organ console. Flowers will be supplied by Aquinas Institute and McQuaid Jesuit High School. All young people are invited to this Sodality tribute to our Lady, which takes on new meaning for us in this centenary year of Lourdes.

St. Boniface To Build New Church

St. Boniface parish is going to have a new church. The new edifice will replace the parish's 70-year-old gothic church ravaged by fire on last Nov. 6.

"It would cost over \$500,000, maybe as much as a million dollars to rebuild the old church," said Father Walter Kohl, pastor of the Gregory St. parish.

"WE HAD THE best engineers and architects in the area survey the damage done by the fire," he said, "and they all agreed it would be unwise and unsafe to try to repair the shell that we see out there now."

"Bishop Kearney told me to have an architect draw up plans for a new church with a seating capacity of about 700 people," the pastor revealed.

"That is just the size church our parish needs," he said. "There are about 2000 people coming to Mass here on Sundays so the 700 capacity will take care of our needs very nicely."

The new church will probably cost about \$425,000, he stated.

"That's about what churches the size we plan to build cost these days. But that amount will vary depending on style and furnishings and many other factors," Father Kohl said.

Announcement of the Bishop's decision was made by Father Kohl at Masses on Sunday.

PARISHIONERS HAVE been attending daily and Sunday Mass in the parochial school auditorium since fire struck this historic church last November.

At that time plans were nearing completion to redecorate the gothic edifice in preparation for the parish centenary in 1959.

"Now we'll be lucky if we can even be into the new church by then," Father Kohl said. "Maybe we'll have to wait until the parish is 101 for our celebration," he said.

Stella Maris Opens Camp Enrollment

McFarland, Executive Director and Resident, and Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, Executive Director and Resident.

Registration will not be open to children outside the Diocese of Rochester until March 15, 1958.

The total fee for two weeks is \$600. The total fee for one week is \$350. Of this total fee, a registration fee of \$500 is due at the time the child is registered and the remainder is due June 1, 1958.

'Operation Webster' Foster Home Drive Launched

A search is on throughout Webster and West Webster to locate foster homes for children in need of a home away from home.

The Rochester diocesan Catholic Family Center in cooperation with other Monroe County social agencies, launched a community-wide "pilot project" yesterday to inform residents of the Webster township of the urgent need for more foster homes.

FATHER DONALD J. Mulcahy, Catholic Family Center director, said pastors at Holy Family Church, Webster, and St. Rita's Church, West Webster, have urged their parishioners to make room in their homes "for one more" if at all possible.

Father Mulcahy said children ranging in age from month-old infants to maturing adolescents are in need of a temporary home until they can be reunited with their own families.

"Their own homes have had a breakdown because of illness, death, or separation of the parents," Father Mulcahy stated. "In other cases the parents are not able to offer a stable home life," he added.

"Children these days have enough problems as it is," said Father Mulcahy. "And if their own home gives them added problems, the least we can do is help them until those problems are solved."

HE SAID the whole township of Webster has a population of over 15,000. "But we have only two homes there with a child from the Catholic Family Center," he stated.

Other Monroe County child care agencies list fourteen additional foster homes in the Webster area.

"We feel sure that if more people realized the need we have for foster homes, we could place many more children with Webster or West Webster families," Father Mulcahy said.

Catholic families of the Webster area who would like to know details about providing foster home care for children are invited to call Father Mulcahy's office, Hamilton 63400.

Participating in the month-long "pilot project" besides the Catholic Family Center are Hillside Children's Center, Jewish Social Service Bureau, Monroe County Child Welfare Division, and Rochester Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. All five are members of the Council of Social Agencies of Rochester and Monroe County.

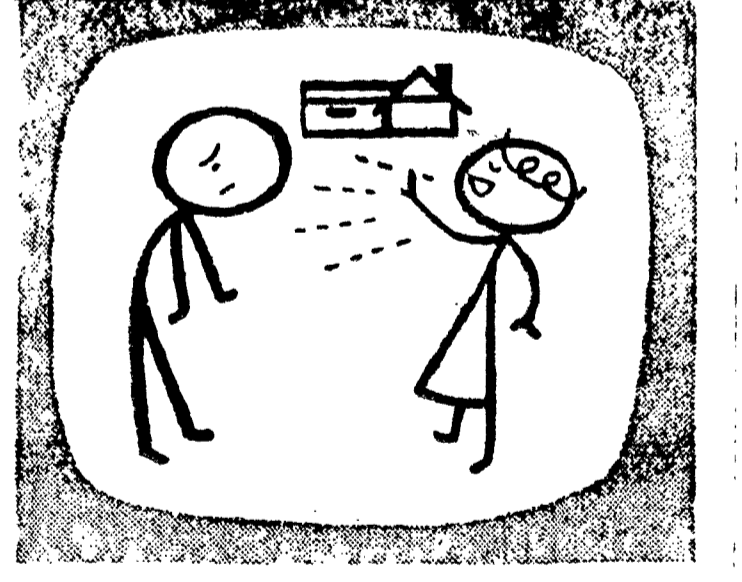
