Dr. Vincent P. Hockeborn of the Science Research Associates, Chicago, Ill. will be the featured speaker at the Parent Teacher Association of Nazareth Academy meeting, Wednesday, Feb. 5 at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium, Lake Ave.

The parents have received profiles of scores attained in a battery of tests published by the Science Research Associates of the State University of Iowa. These tests were administered at Nazareth Academy according to Sister Agnes Cecilia, principal, to determine educational development and growth of students.

DOCTOR Hockeborn will evaluate the testing program for the parents.

Students were advised, Sister Agnes Cecilia said, that the tests have definite value beyond that of scores in regular school subjects. Iowa tests scores compare a student with tests of thousands of other students throughout the country, as well as with students in their own school. They measure the same skills or abilities for all students.

Given yearly the tests show improvements in general abilities.

Doctor Hockeborn will demonstrate the advisability of parents studying the scores, individual and composite, to determine in what general fields a student is weak or to ascertain the possibility for success in college.

Parents after the general assembly may confer with teachers on January examination results. Refreshments in the school cafeteria follow.

Word of the elevation came to Father Kaiser visiting with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kaiser of 440 Eaton Road, Irondequoit, since returning from Germany.

Monsignor Kaiser attended St. Thomas School Aquinas Institute, St. Bonaventure University, and was ordained at St. Edward Seminary, Seattle, Wash. for the diocese of Great Falls, Mont., in 1940.

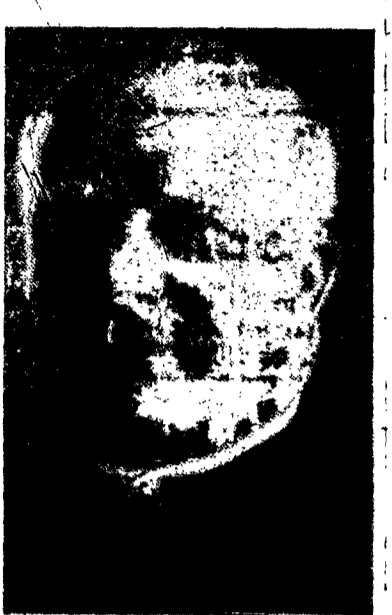
