THERE ARE MORE LEPROS in the world than there are victims of either tuberculosis or cancer. Millions of dollars are available for cancer research, but our poor missionaries, in 300 leper colonies, care for 300,000 lepers with only little aid. How did they ever give themselves to care for those whom most people would shrink from touching? Through faith in Christ Who touched lepers to heal them.

OUR LORD OFTEN TOUCHED THE DISTRESSED. He touched Peter's mother in law and the fever left her; He touched the leper and the corruption disappeared; He touched the deaf child's forehead and he lived; He touched the ears of the deaf man and he heard; He touched the sightless eyes of the blind man and he saw; He touched the hand of the demoniac boy, writhing in the grip of the tormenter and he was freed.

WHAT INTERESTS US PARTICULARLY IS THAT He touched the lepers despite all legal prohibitions and natural repugnance. Touch, St. Thomas Aquinas tells us, is the most sensitive of all the senses. It is also the one most inseparable from pity and compassion.

IT IS NOT GIVEN TO YOU TO TOUCH LEPROS in service as do 1,250 missionary priests, Brothers and Sisters. But you can touch them with the gloves of generosity through your sacrifice for them.

AFTER ALL, their leprosy is merely an outside picture of what a soul looks like in the state of sin. In healing their bodies we can in some manner make up for our sins and help to heal our own souls.
