SISTERS OF ST. BASIL THE GREAT

Sisters of St. Basil the Great, who staff St. Peter and Paul School, Auburn, are unique in their claim as the oldest monastic Order of the Church. The history of the Sisters dates back to the fourth century when St. Basil the Great together with his sister, St. Macrina, founded the Order. The American foundation stems from one of its ancient houses in the South Central Ukraine, when Mother Helen Langensich came to Philadelphia on Nov. 25, 1911 to undertake a work exclusively devoted to those of the Byzantine-Slavonic Rite. The Auburn Sisters belong to the Philadelphia Province. The Order is engaged in the education of youth, care of orphans, sewing of liturgical vestments for the Eastern Church, and the publication of the "Messenger of the Sacred Heart" in the Ukrainian language. In conjunction with the Apostleship of Prayer, the Sisters wear a black habit and black veil with a white wimple and a silver crucifix. (One of a series.)
