AMONG WOMEN

Writers Need Readers

February, Catholic Press month, presents us with an opportunity to evaluate our attitude toward reading; for it is axiomatic that writers must have readers; and there are many people today who seriously question if the supply of the latter is keeping pace with that of the former.

My own experience seems to indicate that, given an opportunity to read, today's young people are avid readers as their parents may be. It follows that a parent who is not interested in reading and who does not provide opportunities and suitable materials for reading is not likely to have a child interested in reading.

The English teachers of New York State have published a most interesting monograph entitled "The Child's Personal Reading" in the foreword of which they point out:

"LITERATURE is a magical realm which invites all, both old and young to enjoy its riches. Children can be so guided in their early years that they will form reading habits which will continue throughout life. Into each life will come a new depth that singular richness which owes its very inception to the printed page.

"Symptomatically stimulated teachers and parents can inspire boys and girls to want to read. By reading, children can relive experiences of the past as well as those of the present and can come to understand themselves and their problems through a knowledge and appreciation of the lives of others.

"Into the life of each child there can come an alertness to current happenings, an eagerness to become a part of the world around him. As he continues to read, he develops the ability to pass judgment in both selection of reading material and authenticity of statement.

"The child who is richly inspired by his literary experiences is satisfied only as he broadens his horizons by continuous contact with the printed page."

In one of the articles entitled, "Stimulating the Child to Read Independently" the author declares:

"IF I HAD but one wish to make, it would be that every

child have someone who loves him enough to read to him, from the time he crawls the crib searching for something soothing like a nursery rhyme, through the years when he seeks the thrill of adventure and new discovery, to the time when reading consists, perhaps of sharing-choice literary 'tid-bits' over the dinner table."

This last suggestion we have found particularly helpful. Children, as every parent knows, like to know what the parents are talking about. They want to belong to the group and if the family group contains adult readers, the younger members will want to be in on the fun.

Our own reading program then should be a direct challenge to us, since it can be used not only to enrich our own lives but also the lives of those around us, and particularly those young minds and hearts which have been entrusted to us.
