# Catholics In U.S. Over 43 Million

Washington — (NC) — Census Bureau figures indicate that about 43,635,000 Americans regard themselves as Catholics — about 9.2 million more than listed by the 1957 Official Catholic Directory.

The bureau estimated here that about 30,669,000 Americans over the age of 14 call themselves Catholics.

The figure of 43 million is based on calculations that give an estimate of the number of Catholics under 14 years of age who are usually counted as Church members, though the census survey excluded them.

RECENT CENSUS statistics on the percentage of the entire population under 14 were applied to the Catholic population to produce the estimate.

The P. J. Kennedy and Sons publishing company which publishes the Official Catholic Directory, gave 31,386,350 as its estimated U. S. Catholic population in the 1957 edition. The figure was based on reports submitted by U. S. dioceses.

The census bureau's estimate of those over 14 who call themselves Catholics is based on the reports of persons who volunteered their religion. No attempt was made to determine if they could be termed "practicing" members of the religion they professed.

Highpoints in the results announced here of the bureau's

March, 1957, sample survey of the civilian population include:

• Ninety-six per cent of those interviewed professed a religion.

• American Catholics are located largely in the northeast section of the country.

• A high percentage of marriages involve partners who are members of the same "major religious group."

• Catholics have more mixed marriages than members of either Protestant or Jewish bodies.

• More women than men profess Catholicism.

• The Baptists are the largest single Protestant denomination.

In the March survey, information was gathered on persons over 14 in 35,000 households across the country. These figures were projected in the study, the first time the government agency has conducted a nationwide sample survey.

Two out of every three persons 14 years and over in the United States regard themselves as Protestant and about one out of every four as Roman Catholic, said the bureau's announcement.

## Bingo Amendment Killed In Colorado

Denver — (RNS) — A constitutional amendment to legalize bingo which has been fought by Prohibitionists was killed in the Colorado House by a vote of 31 to 21.

If it had passed, it would have allowed the game to be played in the state. The amendment was defeated by a vote of 31 to 21.

Despite the defeat, the amendment will be on the ballot at the next election.

James L. Kelly, representing the American Legion, said his organization would sponsor a campaign to put the matter on the ballot by a future election.

## Papal Audiences Slated For Pilgrimages

Vatican City — (NC) — Members of Lourdes centennial year pilgrimages, which also visit Rome, will be admitted to the weekly general audiences granted by Pope Pius XII.

The pope took the role of the many pilgrimages, especially those outside of Europe, which have announced they will include Rome in their pilgrimages in order to pay homage to the Supreme Pontiff. It also said that a great number of other groups and congresses have applied for such access.

ROME (AP) — The pope will grant access to his weekly audiences to members of pilgrimages passing through Rome on their way to Lourdes.

They are to be invited to arrange the visits in Rome in such a way that they will be able to participate in the weekly general audience that takes place on Wednesday, to which they of course will be admitted.

# 'New Generation' Method Scored

London — (NC) — Archbishop William Godfrey of Westminster has warned this nation that to give the sanction of law to the practice of artificial insemination would be to court disaster.

The Archbishop, making his first public statement on the subject since it recently blew up into a front page controversy in Britain, did not mention artificial insemination, by name but referred to it as "new methods of generation."

"TO INTRODUCE legislation which permits to persons, rather than to nature, the right to beget children," the Archbishop said, "is to invite disaster upon the human race."

## Druggists Vote To Curb Smut Literature Sales

The organization also recommended a similar move by the parent California Pharmaceutical Association which has a membership of 2,500 druggists.
