

Work On New School Planned For Corning Parish In June



Plan Day Of Recollection

Corning — Pending final approval by the diocesan building commission, plans now call for construction of the new 8-room St. Mary's parochial school to begin after school closes in June, according to the Rev. Thomas F. Brennan, pastor of St. Mary's parish.

Father Brennan announced that the final figure in the parish fund-raising campaign is listed at \$307,000.

When the drive was held last September, \$200,000 was set as the minimum goal. Since the new school is expected to cost at least \$400,000, the money represented by the over-subscription will make it possible to do the job with a less extensive use of credit. Father Brennan pointed out. Collections are coming in well, he reported.

THE PROJECT will be carried out in two parts, it was explained in order not to deprive the pupils of classrooms during the construction. After the new section has been completed and opened, the second part of the project, consisting of the razing of the oldest portion of the school and its replacement with a modern wing, will be undertaken.

Since the plans for the new school were announced last Fall, it was decided to locate the kindergarten at the rear, facing north, Father Brennan said. The kindergarten will have its own play yard and entrance. There have also been a number of refinements in the plans. Architect for the project is the firm of Considine & Haskell of Elmira.

It is expected that the first part of the new school to be completed will be opened in January, 1959, the pastor said. No target date was set at present for the opening of the final section.

THE NEW SCHOOL will provide quarters for 120 additional pupils. The present enrollment is 350, with 11 classrooms now in use. Plans also call for the renovation of the gymnasium wing of the present school. The new classrooms will be constructed in the site of the present south wing. Room height is to be nine to 10 feet, in contrast to the high ceilings of the old building. The new wing will include a storage room and an entrance.

A RITCHEY is to be constructed in the gymnasium wing, the remodeling of which will also provide an all-purpose room which can be used as an auditorium. A health room also will be included. The exterior of the new building will be of brick.

St. Mary's School was opened in the Fall of 1855, with one room in the church basement being used. The parish had been organized in 1848. In 1860 the corner lot across from the church was acquired, and a new building was constructed and opened in the following Fall.

In August, 1882, Bishop Steven Vincent Ryan laid the cornerstone of a new building, which now constitutes the older portion of the school, which will be razed. It is on the corner of West First and State Streets. The present gymnasium wing was constructed in 1910 as an addition and was opened in January, 1911.

The present faculty is composed of nine Sister of Mercy and two lay teachers. Principal is Sister Mary Rita, who succeeded Sister Mary Adolphine last Fall. The latter had served as principal since 1954.
