

Services Scheduled To Observe Our Lady Of Lourdes Centenary

Many parishes and schools announced this week special services to mark the feast of our Lady of Lourdes. The feast will be celebrated Tuesday, Feb. 11.

Additional parishes are expected to schedule similar services to be announced by pastors at this Sunday's Masses.

The feast this year will mark the 100th anniversary of the Blessed Virgin's first apparition at Lourdes, a village in southern France, in 1858.

Our Lady made a total of eighteen apparitions in that year to the peasant girl now St. Bernadette Soubirous. The site has subsequently developed into a world-famous shrine noted for its miracles and outstanding spiritual graces.

Following are schedules of services as reported this week to the Courier Journal:

SACRED HEART CATHEDRAL—Mass will be offered Tuesday at Sacred Heart Cathedral at 5:30 p.m. In addition to the usual morning Masses to mark the feast of our Lady of Lourdes.

Auxiliary Bishop Casey, Cathedral rector, said a triduum will be held there in preparation for the March 25th feast of the Annunciation.

CORPUS CHRISTI CHURCH—A novena is now in progress at Corpus Christi Church, Rochester, and will climax with solemn Mass Tuesday evening at 7:45 p.m.

Monsignor John E. Magey, administrator of the parish, has issued an invitation to "come and join us" for the remaining portion of the novena. Services each evening begin at 7:45 p.m., he said.

Following novena services each evening, people attending are blessed with water brought from the miraculous fountain at the Lourdes grotto.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH—The Lourdes shrine at St. Andrew's Church, Rochester, will be focus of a triduum there beginning Sunday at 7:45 p.m. Father John Taret, S.J., will preach each evening, according to Monsignor George W. Eckl, pastor.

Monsignor Eckl said the parish shrine is a replica of the actual Lourdes. Even the miraculous fountain is simulated in the St. Andrew's reproduction.

Water brought from Lourdes trickles to a font where people may bless themselves just as at the famed French shrine itself.

The St. Andrew's shrine is a memorial gift honoring the late Frank X. Foery, first trustee of the parish and uncle of Syracuse Bishop Walter A. Foery. Monsignor Eckl said.

The three day services will conclude with solemn Mass Tuesday at 7:45 p.m.

OUR LADY OF LOURDES—Brighton's Our Lady of Lourdes Church will also hold triduum services Sunday, Monday and Tuesday evenings.

Lourdes water from the shrine in France will be given to those attending the triduum. Monsignor Francis Luddy, pastor, said today.

Father Dennis Walsh, C.P., will preach the sermons at evening services scheduled for 8 p.m.

Campaign End Set Monday For Sisters New College

Final results in the fund appeal of the Sisters of Mercy for construction of a teacher-training college building on Blossom Road will be announced at a committee meeting at 8 p.m. Monday, Feb. 10, in Our Lady of Mercy High School.

More than 600 men and women have been seeking pledges to ward the proposed building among friends of the Sisters in the Monroe County area. Committees also have been canvassing in six other communities of the diocese where the Sisters teach. Final reports of all groups are due Monday.

Estimated at \$125,000, the new building, to be a west wing of the motherhouse, will house Catherine McAuley Junior College, which prepares young Sisters for teaching in diocesan schools. Construction will begin in early spring.

With an enrollment of nearly 100, the college now is conducted in inadequate quarters in the motherhouse basement. State education authorities have given the Sisters until 1959 to obtain better facilities in order to gain a permanent charter.

THE CONSECRATION ceremony will take place at 2:30 p.m. in the chapel. Twenty six junior societas will renew their act of consecration for one year. Forty four sophomore candidates will make a temporary act of consecration for one year. Father John W. LaVeque will speak.

The ceremony will be followed by a party in the cafeteria for the Societas, sponsored by the Senior Societas. General chairman is Kathleen McCarthy.

700 Children Enrolled In Holy Childhood

Holy Childhood Day was observed at St. Augustine's School Monday, Feb. 3, with enrollment of 700 children by the Rev. George S. Wood, diocesan director.

The children were told about the growing need for young missionaries at home to rescue other young children from paganism and Communism. In the 117 years that Holy Childhood has been in existence over 40 million pagan children were ransomed.

The CEREMONY, which included the presentation of a medal and membership card to each child, was climaxed by the bestowing of the Papal blessing, conveying a plenary indulgence to all present on the day of their enrollment.

Once enrolled, each child is officially an Apostle of Christ and is entitled to share in all the spiritual favors bestowed on the Association by the Roman Pontiffs.

Monsignor John M. Duffy, pastor, and Sister Clara Marie, principal, presented an application for six adoptions and offered a pledge of their continued support in the future.

Foster Home Search On In Webster

The season's record snow storm slowed up but failed to stop the current drive to find foster homes for children currently being conducted in the Webster area by the Council of Social Agencies.

Following last week's launching of the campaign which will continue through out February, the Rochester Catholic Family Center reported that it had received queries from almost a dozen Webster families seeking information on the role of the foster home.

QUERIES from prospective foster parents were also reported by other member agencies of the Council including the Hillside Children's Center, Jewish Social Service Bureau, Monroe County Child Welfare Division and the Rochester Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. These agencies along with the Catholic Family Center comprise the five member groups of the Council of Social Agencies of Rochester and Monroe County.

The Council's concentrated effort to find foster homes among Webster residents uncovers a critical need according to the child care organizations to provide for a large number of children temporarily in need of a home until they can be reunited with their own families.

According to spokesmen for the child care agencies, children needing homes range in age from month old infants to teenagers.

SUPPORTING THE foster home campaign, along with other civic and religious groups are Webster's two Catholic parishes, Holy Trinity and St. Rita's, George Montgomery, executive director of the Catholic Family Center will talk on foster home care this Sunday at the Communion breakfast of the Holy Trinity Holy Name Society.
