

'Homemaker Of Tomorrow' Named At Nazareth

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Nazareth Academy is Mary Louise Burdulis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Burdulis, 9 Morrill St., of St. Michael Parish.

She received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes, administered Dec. 3 to seniors. Her examination paper will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. For her achievement, she will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

THE NATIONAL winner in the fourth annual Betty Crocker Search conducted among 327,000 young women in 11,800 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 17 at a banquet in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City.

Each State Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the second ranking girl in each state. The school of the state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$200. Girls who rank second, third and fourth in the nation will receive \$100, \$300 and \$200 scholarships, respectively.

Aquinas Astronomy Club To Track Earth Satellites

Earth Satellites and the emphasis on science have resulted in the formation of an astronomy club at Aquinas Institute according to the Rev. John M. Wilson, C.S.B., director of scientific research at the school.

The Rev. Alan Genca, C.S.B., moderator, said that the activities of the club will be centered around the International Geophysical Year, particularly the launching of space satellites and the experimental work carried on at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Working closely with the physics and radio clubs, the new club hopes to obtain audio and visual "fixes" on future American satellites.

CWV Commander Cites Fight Against Indecent Books In Public Schools

The current program of the Catholic War Veterans to combat indecent books found in libraries of the nation's public schools has rocked the nation, according to National Commander Peter J. Hopkins of Yorkers. He spoke at the banquet following the afternoon session of the twelfth annual convention, Monroe County Chapter, Catholic War Veterans, Sunday in Powers Hotel.

The program has gained widespread support from citizens and taxpayers in general, as well as from other veterans organizations, according to Hopkins. "With perseverance and prayer we will win this fight for decency," he said. He commended the Monroe County Chapter for its annual Outstanding Catholic Layman and Laywoman Awards.

He pointed out that today there is a great deal of discussion among intellectuals and liberals for conferences with the Soviet Union. "Those who propose such meetings must be blind to the history of double talk and broken promises of the Soviet Union," he said. "How do you bargain with international brigands? The Catholic War Veterans are opposed to any deals, agreements or what have you with the Soviet Union," he said.

A pre-tenet dessert-luncheon is planned by the Catholic Women's Club for Friday, Feb. 14, at 1 p.m. at the club house.

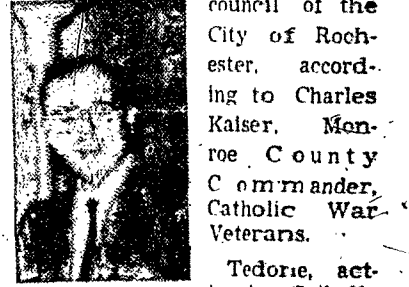
