Corning Nun Credited With Aiding Elmira Teacher To Achieve Goal

Corning — Sister Loretta, a fifth grade teacher at St. Mary's School, Corning, is given credit for making it possible for a former Brooklyn student to achieve a lifelong dream — becoming a teacher in Elmira.

Teacher Arlene Dolinsky, a fifth grade teacher here at Booth School in Elmira, was the subject of a feature story in the Elmira Star-Gazette. The article, penned by Covey Hoover, follows:

Little Arlene Dolinsky had a dream. She wanted to be a teacher. Specifically, she wanted to teach the fifth grade.

The years have passed. Arlene is a teacher. And she teaches fifth graders at Booth School.

Her 33 pupils don't realize that their teacher's path turned toward their own when her family moved to Elmira from Brooklyn and enrolled Arlene at St. Patrick's School. The transfer in schools brought on a curriculum crisis. There was a question of her being able to stay in the fifth grade.

A KINDLY NUN took care of the question. "Sister Loretta worked so hard with me," reminisces Arlene. "I had to make good. She took such an interest."

The interest helped carry Arlene on to Catholic High, Elmira Free Academy and Cortland State Teachers College. Her healthy good looks won her several titles along the way. Miss Elmira, Miss Eastern League and Cortland Homecoming Queen, but none of these possible headlines deterred her from her goal. She received her Bachelor of Science degree in elementary education last June.

Sister Loretta's influence was

great. It still is. You see it in Arlene's classroom where the basic philosophy is simple. "A class is her work as a big responsibility in a contributing role to society. You're molding them. Your attitude, your personality, your character. All have an impact."

HER PUPILS DO have rich experiences. Possibly because of her own experiences, she has a few "old-fashioned" attitudes. They are on a discussion of the moon system as if it is a "newly discovered planet."

Arlene's class is a big asset to the community. She is grateful to her fellow faculty members. They're wonderful. They're cooperative. She feels she can go to any one of them for discussion or guidance.

Principal G. Fitzsimon, Bradley helps explain that as Arlene takes to some pupils by her desk. He cites her desire to teach her understanding of youngsters and her quiet efficiency. "We here, also know we have a teacher."

His content and one from Arlene herself might be the hallmarks of her life to date. "I couldn't possibly be happy doing anything else," she says.

FEW PEOPLE GET an opportunity to realize their fondest hope. For it appears that the little girl who listened to Sister Loretta at St. Patrick's has had her dream come true.

There is a letter about most things they do. In one activity, the class conducts a news broadcast. The telephone is a stick and a tin can and the broadcast is authentic. Real news of the day. Plus singing commercials. Everyone participates at some time or another. They want to be happy.

The use of a court system gives the youngsters a sense of "learning things" and helps instill a sense of discipline. "It has to be done from within," says their teacher. "They have to learn to be dependent and independent. We try to have them learn in the classroom."
