

'Homemaker Of Tomorrow' Named At Nazareth

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Nazareth Academy is Mary Louise Burdulis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Burdulis, 9 Morrill St., of St. Michael Parish.

She received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes, administered Dec. 3 to seniors. Her examination paper will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. For her achievement, she will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

THE NATIONAL winner in the fourth annual Betty Crocker Search conducted among 327,000 young women in 11,200 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 17 at a banquet in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

Each State Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$300 scholarship will be awarded the second ranked girl in each state. The school of the state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$2,000. Girls who rank second, third and fourth in the nation will receive \$1,000, \$500 and \$200 scholarships, respectively.

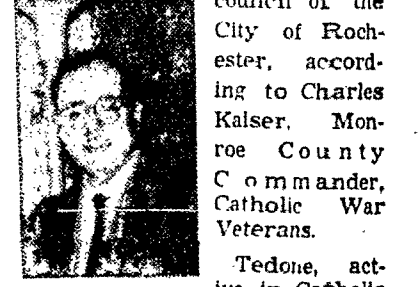

CWV Commander Cites Fight Against Indecent Books In Public Schools

The current program of the Catholic War Veterans to combat indecent books found in libraries of the nation's public schools has rocked the nation, according to National Commander Peter J. Hopkins of Yonkers. He spoke at the banquet following the afternoon session of the twelfth annual convention, Monroe County Chapter, Catholic War Veterans, Sunday in Powers Hotel.

The program has gained widespread support from citizens and taxpayers in general, as well as from other veterans organizations, according to Hopkins. "With perseverance and prayer we will win this fight for decency," he said. He commended the Monroe County Chapter for its annual Outstanding Catholic Layman and Laywoman Awards.

He pointed out that today there is a great deal of discussion among intellectuals and liberals for conferences with the Soviet Union. "Those who propose such meetings must be blind to the history of double talk and broken promises of the Soviet Union," he said. "How do you bargain with international brigands? The Catholic War Veterans are opposed to any deals, agreements or what have you with the Soviet Union," he said.

SPEAKING of the American prisoners of war in Red China, he urged those present to take immediate action to effect their release. "Let Congress know that you are interested in these boys," he said. Commander Hopkins said that the Catholic War Veterans are aware of current efforts to "sift the meat from the budget, while the fat remains on financial expenditures elsewhere." He said, "Let's begin cutting expenditures far away and leave the veterans appropriations in the budget exactly as they are."

The veterans by resolution commended the newly organized Civic Indecent Literature Committee for the noteworthy public service which each member is performing.

Besides Commander Hopkins, other guests included Monsignor Joseph R. Koch, State Chaplain, Catholic War Veterans, Charles F. Shelley, state commander, and Mrs. Dorothy Hillen, state auxiliary president.

MISGR. KOCH—a native of Rochester, spoke on the history of the organization on the national level. "The Catholic War Veterans is the only organization of Catholic laymen and lay women recognized by the Veterans Administration," he said.

Stressing that the Catholic War Veterans has taken an ever increasing role in promoting the welfare of our citizens and in bringing Christian principles into the home, he pointed out that the organization faces a serious problem in membership. "The Catholic War Veterans warrants a larger membership than it has. Its current membership is far out of proportion to eligible Catholic veterans in Monroe County," he said. "Most of the eligible veterans are victims of apathy and indifference. Many have not been contacted personally and know little of Catholic War Veterans." Monsignor Koch also urged posts in Monroe County to carry out an active program to increase membership.
