# Over \$500,000 Pledged To Nuns

Construction of a building for the Sisters of Mercy teachers' college, scheduled in early spring, received a half-million dollar boost this week from committees soliciting funds to aid the project.

Pledges totaling \$503,127 were reported Tuesday by groups in Monroe County and six other diocesan communities, with many prospect cards still unreported.

The proposed three-story building, to be a west wing of the Sisters of Mercy Motherhouse, 1437 Blossom Rd., will house Catherine McAuley Junior College, which prepares young Sisters for teaching in diocesan schools.

With 100 Sisters now enrolled, the college is conducted in the motherhouse basement. State education authorities have given the Sisters until 1959 to provide better quarters in order to obtain a permanent college charter.

Solicitation of pledges began several weeks ago among friends of the Sisters, to lessen the amount of money they would have to borrow to undertake construction of the new building, which will cost an estimated \$1,250,000.

HAROLD J. COLEMAN and Mrs. Walter B. Hickey, campaign chairmen, hailed the result as "a tremendous tribute of appreciation to the Sisters, who have labored so zealously in the Rochester Diocese for 100 years."

Mother Mary Magdalene, mother general of the Sisters' community, expressed appreciation to the committees of more than 800 men and women, and told them they have greatly aided the cause of religious vocations and Catholic education. She pointed out that the proposed structure is needed not only to better prepare Sister-teachers, but also to provide more space in the motherhouse for new postulants and for retired Sisters.

CONDUCTED IN diocesan areas where the Sisters of Mercy teach, the campaign pledge total of \$503,127 was reported as follows:

Monroe County, \$366,672; Elmira, \$46,286; Newark, \$28,000; Auburn, \$22,000; Corning, \$18,500; Hornell, \$14,286; Clyde, \$7,538. In most cases the result is not yet considered complete, particularly in Monroe County, where among cards still out are several in local industries.

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# Parish, Seminary Share In Bequests

## Ithaca Woman Remembers Many Catholic Institutions

Ithaca — St. Bernard's Seminary and Immaculate Conception Church of Ithaca were two of the chief beneficiaries in the estate of the late Bridget Cecelia O'Brien, whose will was probated Feb. 4 in the Surrogate's Court of Tompkins County.

A life-long resident of Ithaca, Miss O'Brien died Jan. 6, 1958. She operated a student's rooming house with her late sister, Mary O'Brien, for Cornell students for many years.

St. Bernard's Seminary received a bequest of \$10,000 according to the will. Immaculate Conception Church received bequests totaling \$29,000. They were: \$7,000 for Masses to be said in the memory of her family and herself; \$10,000 to the parish building fund in honor of her family; \$10,000 to be applied to the church debt; \$1,000 to the church's Altar and Rosary Society, and \$1,000 to the church's Court Santa Maria No. 240, Catholic Daughters of America.

Other diocesan institutions which also were mentioned in the will were \$3,000 to St. Anne's Home, Rochester and \$3,000 to Monsignor Donald Cleary, for use in the Catholic Chapel at Cornell. Catholic Institutions outside

Total contributions to Catholic institutions were \$52,000. There were also individual bequests in the will.

MONSIGNOR WILLIAM BYRNE, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, told the COURIER-JOURNAL that Miss O'Brien, who was about 84 at the time of her death, was "highly respected in the community and a longtime, faithful member of Immaculate Conception parish."

The Tompkins County Trust Company is executor for the estate and James J. Clynes Jr., of the law firm of Treman and Clynes is attorney for the estate.
