The contest which closes March 15, has four divisions: I — 4th, 5th, and 6th grades limited to 8 lines; II — 7th, 8th and 9th grades, limited to 8 lines; III — 10th, 11th and 12th grades, limited to 12 lines; IV — women college students, and nuns limited to 12 lines.

Poems must be original and have a Catholic theme. ENTRIES SHOULD be submitted on 8 1/2 by 11 white paper (handwritten or typed) and sent to Dorothy A. Walthers, 189 Curtis St., Rochester 6, N. Y., who is chairman of education for the court.

Students should sign names to the poem but should attach a cover sheet containing the following information: division number, student's name, grade and name of school and the name, number and location of court sponsorship. Local, state and national prizes will be awarded to the winners at the various levels. Only one entry per student may be entered in state contest.

From time to time, in this column, I have paused to discuss and to try to evaluate the mail which it elicits.
