

Lenten Discussion Programs Set Up

Two thousand members are expected to take part in the Lenten Discussion Club program throughout the Diocese of Rochester between now and Easter according to the Rev. Albert H. Schmacky, director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

Eight or 10 members of each club meet once a week to discuss "Love In Action" as contained in the booklet by the Rev. Leo J. Trese of Detroit. These booklets are available through Trants, 96 Clinton Ave., Rochester.

Ten Points for Lenten Discussion Club members to remember are outlined by Father Schmacky.

1. Join a club — you won't live your faith unless you know it.
2. Attend regularly — when you miss, you miss out.
3. Have the text — you are sure of yourself if you use it.
4. Stick to the text — otherwise you will be stuck.
5. Use discussion aids — they are like spurs; useless unless used.
6. Take part in discussion — you are not a clam, don't act like one.
7. Don't monopolize the discussion — you are not a phonograph, don't act like one.

8. Think aloud — say what you know; this helps you to know what you say.

9. Ask questions — a wandering mind stimulates wandering minds.

10. Form your own club this Lent — don't keep the Faith; share it.

Philippine Catholicism Described in Owego Talk

Owego—Miss Donata V. Taylor, of Manila, Philippine Islands spoke at the February meeting of St. Patrick's Ruary and Altar Society in the parish hall. Business session was conducted by Mrs. Mary Rutherford, president.

Miss Taylor, who is a student at Cornell University, on a Fulbright Scholarship, was introduced by Miss Eva Ferra, of Ithaca, who is chairman of the International Relations Committee of the National Council of Catholic Women in the Ithaca area. Miss Taylor, told of the introduction of Catholicism in the Philippines by the Spaniards in 1621, and how the native residents of her country accepted the new religion, gladly and with enthusiasm.

The Catholic religion spread so quickly, she said that the first Bishop of Manila was appointed by the Holy See in 1578. Miss Taylor, said the people of her country followed the Spanish customs, until the Americans came there in 1898.

During the years between these dates, every Spanish ship that arrived in Manila, carried at least one Catholic priest, who strove to spread the Catholic faith. Now many American missionaries are carrying on the work, and they are training native priests to work among their own people.

She described the ceremonies of Holy Week in particular, and said they differed, somewhat from the Holy Week services in America. The main devotion to the Blessed Virgin in the Philippines is under her title of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

Surviving are: his wife, the former Sylvia Plaquadio of Galeton, Pa., now of Rochester; a daughter, Sylvia, aged five; his father and a brother, Donald Keough, all of Rochester.
