In addition to the three rounds of debating, the McQuaid speakers each participated in another speaking event. Angione in original oratory, McGrath in humorous oratory, Melsenzahl in oratorical interpretation, and Northrup in extemporaneous speaking.

Accompanying the orators was the Rev. John J. Paret, S.J., moderator of the Campbell debating society at McQuaid.

The festival trophy given to the team which amassed the most points from all five speaking events was won by Mount Carmel High School of Chicago.

Numbers among the fourteen schools participating in the tournament were several from western New York, including Aquinas Institute of Rochester, Canisius High of Buffalo, Jamestown High School, St. Mary's Academy, Kenmore, and Webster Central. Other participants were two schools from the Chicago area and several from the Province of Ontario.
