## Scranton Educator Gives Communion Breakfast Talk

The Rev. G. Gordon Henderson, S.J. of the University of Scranton, told members of Elmira Council 229, Knights of Columbus, that "neglect is the primary cause of juvenile delinquency."

The occasion was the annual corporate Communion Breakfast held at the Dunn Memorial last Sunday, which was preceded by Mass and the reception of Holy Communion.

Father Henderson urged the council members to strive to assist youngsters in programs that will curb delinquency.

The university guidance counselor said that while such things as Sputniks are important in our everyday life, youth is more important for today and the future.

FATHER HENDERSON urged intense Catholic action by all members of the council. He urged members never to be self-conscious about their faith but to defend it with vigor.

The priest advised council members to provide leadership in their community and in doing so make it a better place in which to live.

The speaker said that "we don't know how lucky we are." He said that in meeting other members of the Jesuit society from other parts of the world and after hearing of the conditions under which they have lived, one realizes that we live in a wonderful country.

## Corning Dentist Awarded Army Commendation Ribbon

Corning — Dr. Vincent J. Semintelli, who was a captain in the Fort Dix Dental Service, was cited only a week ago before receiving his discharge, opened an office here for the practice of dentistry Monday of this week. It is located in the office building of Dr. C. M. Lapp.

Dr. Semintelli, who was released to an active reserve status with rank of captain, was awarded the Army Commendation Ribbon with Metal Pendant by Col. E. H. Vandervort, post dental surgeon at Fort Dix.

The young former Army dentist is now residing with his family at 234 Chemung St. He is the son of Vincenzo (Jimmy) Semintelli, well known W. Market St. restaurant man, and Mrs. Semintelli of 131 Kingsbury Ave.

ACCORDING TO the citation accompanying the award, "Captain Semintelli has displayed unusual initiative in all duties assigned to him, and has demonstrated outstanding professional ability in all phases of military dentistry." Singled out for praise were his achievements as supply officer for the new dental clinic opened at Dix last August, and as a teacher in the clinic's professional training program.

Dr. Semintelli attended St. Mary School and was graduated from Corning Free Academy with the class of 1947. He attended Fordham University and the University of Buffalo where he received his degree in 1951.

After serving his internship at the Buffalo Veteran's Hospital, he became a staff dentist in June 1953 at the Buffalo State Hospital and continued in this capacity until he reported for Army duty in February 1956.

For the past two years, Dr. Semintelli was stationed at Ft. Dix, N. J.

His wife is the former Eleanor Grace of Elmira. They have four sons, Vincent 4<sup>th</sup>, Mark 3, Robert 2 and John 1.

# Jesuit Survivor Of Hiroshima Bomb To Speak At Catholic Family Dinner

"I was A-Bombed" is the topic for the Rev. Hubert F. Schiffer, S.J., principal speaker for the 28th Anniversary Dinner of the Catholic Family Service, Sunday evening, March 2, at Mark Twain Hotel, Elmira.

A Jesuit priest, he survived the bombing of Hiroshima and helped rebuild the Japanese City. He is on the faculty of a Japanese University and was instrumental in rehabilitation work for children in Japan after World War II.

FATHER SCHIFFER was serving at the Jesuit Church of Our Lady's Assumption in Hiroshima, when an American Bomber dropped an atomic bomb on the city on August 6, 1945. "If I live a hundred years, I'll never quite get those few minutes out of my mind," said Father Schiffer. "I could see nothing, hear no sound — I must be dead I thought."

After a convalescence of more than a year, Father Schiffer who to this day carries glass and splinters from the atomic explosion in his body was permitted to go back to work. The Jesuit priest then called some Japanese Sisters to Hiroshima to open an orphanage as there was a great need for such a home for thousands of homeless children, who were wandering around the city. They slept in holes, under bridges or in empty freight cars. Stealing food was the only way they knew to survive and they acted like alley cats.

IN DECEMBER of 1947, the Hiroshima "Garden of Light" began shedding its beams of compassion on homeless children. Today, nearly 100 boys and girls of all ages are living, learning and playing in this home, founded by Father Schiffer, against every conceivable obstacle.
