

Nazareth Slates Special Speakers

Nazareth College freshmen and sophomores will hear Douglas Hyde, noted English speaker and author, at their March 6 meeting at 10:35 a.m. in the college auditorium. Subject of his lecture will be "Struggle for Africa."

Boy preacher in England at 17, member of the Communist Party at 18, and then managing editor of the London Daily Worker, Douglas Hyde is a person who follows conviction with action. "I Believed," the autobiography of his abandoning Communism and conversion to Catholicism, was selected by six book clubs and translated into a dozen languages.

Hyde commutes to Paris regularly to lecture before NATO at the Defense College. During the past year he has shared the same platform with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer before an audience of 800,000.

On March 7, upperclassmen will hear Major General Bela Kiraly speak on the Hungarian Revolt of 1956 at their class meetings at 11:30 a.m. Major General Kiraly was the commander-in-chief of the Hungarian Infantry and later commander of the Hungarian Army General Staff College. For resisting the Bolshevization of the Hungarian Army he was condemned to death.

After five years in a Communist prison he was paroled and almost immediately, in October of 1956, became the commander-in-chief of the Hungarian National Guard and the Budapest Military Garrison.

Kiraly is the highest ranking military commander to have escaped from behind the Iron Curtain. All students who are free at these periods are invited to hear the speakers. The public is also invited.

Lent gave Our Lord His Wounds; Easter gave Him His Scars. But why in the glory of the Resurrection did He retain the red livid marks of nails and lance? After giving the earth the only serious wound it ever received, the wound of an empty tomb, He said to His Apostles: "Behold My Hands and My Feet."

He kept the Scars:

- 1) As so many mouths to plead before the Throne of His Father for the sins of the world.
- 2) To prove that He is both Priest and Victim. No scars, no priesthood, no offering of self.
- 3) To show all unbelievers at the Last Judgment: "They shall look on Him Whom they have pierced."
- 4) To show that suffering, trials and cares are unavoidable. If the Father did not spare the Son, the Son does not spare us: "Take up your cross daily."
- 5) The scars are also sweet forget-me-nots that bind us to His Love and His Love to us.

Have you any scars? Has a sacrifice for His Kingdom on earth ever wounded your hand because it was hard to give? Has your love of Christ's Vicar on earth ever made you cut into your capital thus making yourself a victim? Shall we go to Calvary each Sunday by assisting at Mass and yet come down with hands unscarred and white? Have we been through no Golgotha of self-denial during Lent, our hearts unrent and unperched?

The Devil once appeared to a saint and looked like Christ. The saint asked: "Where are your scars?" Scar your body a little by sending a little Calvary of self-denial to the Holy Father each week. It need not be much, but the little must be given with love. Your gifts are sent to the Holy Father for the Missions of the world through His Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

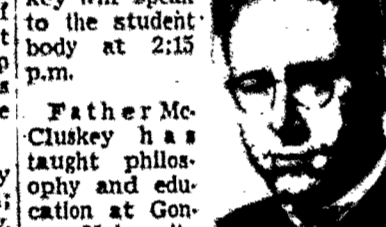
Priest-Attorney Joins University

Washington, D.C.—(RNS)—A Catholic priest-attorney who was admitted to practice before the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court in 1956, has joined the canon law faculty of the Catholic University of America here.

He is the Rev. John McGrath who was a practicing lawyer in his father's Pittsburgh, Pa., firm before entering the priesthood. Father McGrath was ordained in Steubenville, O., in 1954 at the age of 31. He served as a diocesan priest there before becoming a student of church law at Catholic University.

Nazareth College Lists 'America' Education Editor

The Rev. Neil G. McCluskey, S.J., teacher, lecturer and education editor of the national Catholic weekly review, America, will be a campus visitor at Nazareth College on Tuesday, March 4. His visit is being sponsored by the art program of the Association of American Colleges. Father McCluskey will speak to the student body at 2:15 p.m.



Father McCluskey has a taught philosophy and education at Gonzaga University in Spokane and Fr. McCluskey at Seattle University. During 1952-54 he made a survey of European education and has lectured in a dozen European cities.

Vermont To Name Catholic Justice

Montpelier, Vt.—(RNS)—For the first time in the 180-year-old history of the state Supreme Court a Roman Catholic is expected to be named Chief Justice. He is Associate Justice Walter E. Cleary of Newport, Vt., who is scheduled to move into the office upon the resignation of Chief Justice Olin M. Jeffords March 1.

Judge Cleary's promotion is expected to be approved by Gov. Joseph B. Johnson in keeping with the traditional "line of succession" make-up of the court.

A native of Seattle, Father McCluskey studied at Gonzaga University, where he received the B.A. and M.A. degrees. From Alma College in California he earned the S.T.L. degree, and the Ph.D. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University.

During his visit at Nazareth Father McCluskey will give a lecture on the much-discussed, stimulating topic, "Conflicting Philosophies of Current Education."

St. Pius X Lists School Fund Drive

A new 12-room school building will be opened in September adjoining St. Pius X Church, 3000 Chili Ave., it was announced this week by the Rev. Donald J. Murphy, pastor. Construction will begin in early Spring.

Fund pledges toward the project will be sought in a parish-wide solicitation on Sunday afternoon, Mar. 16.

Continuing increase in parish population, reflecting Rochester suburban growth, necessitates the new building, Father Murphy told parishioners last Sunday.

Nearly 150 pupils are enrolled in the present St. Pius School, conducted in remodeled old buildings on Chestnut Ridge Rd., approximately one mile from the recently-obtained new church property on Chili Avenue.

With five grades now enrolled, there is no room for next September's six grades, Father Murphy pointed out, one grade is being added each year.

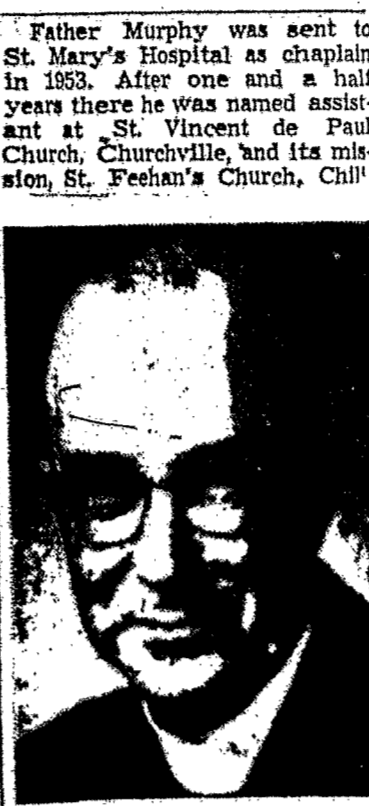
Three Sisters of St. Joseph and a lay teacher staff the present classes, three of which are held in the former church hall and two in the former church building.

"Our parishioners have indicated their willingness," Father Murphy said, "to undergo financial sacrifice for an adequate, modern school building even though, during the last two years, these same persons have contributed generously toward the construction of our new church building."

St. Pius X parish was established in 1954 with the appointment of Father Murphy as first resident pastor. Shortly after his assignment Father Murphy made known the purchase of 11 acres of land on Chili Avenue. Additional land has since been added.

LONG RANGE plans call for establishment of the entire parish plant on the new site. A frame dwelling adjacent to a new church now serves as a convent. The rectory is in part of the original building on Chestnut Ridge Rd.

Prior to World War II, Father Murphy served as assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester, for six years. After three years' service as an Army chaplain he was named assistant at St. Thomas Church, Irondequoit, and taught at Aquinas Institute for six years.

Penfield Parish Enlists Workers For Campaign

More than 200 men of St. Joseph's Parish, Penfield, have enlisted as volunteer workers in the campaign to raise \$125,000 for construction of a school addition and rectory, according to the Rev. John D. Malley, pastor.

While the most immediate need and the primary purpose of the drive is an addition to the parish school, Father Malley stated it is hoped sufficient funds will be raised to finance construction of a new rectory thus making the present rectory available as a convent for the Sisters who staff the school.

Hardships endured by the Sisters, who presently live in the convent of a neighboring parish, some distance from the scene of their labors were outlined by the pastor at a meeting of the general committee held at St. Joseph's School on Feb. 21.
