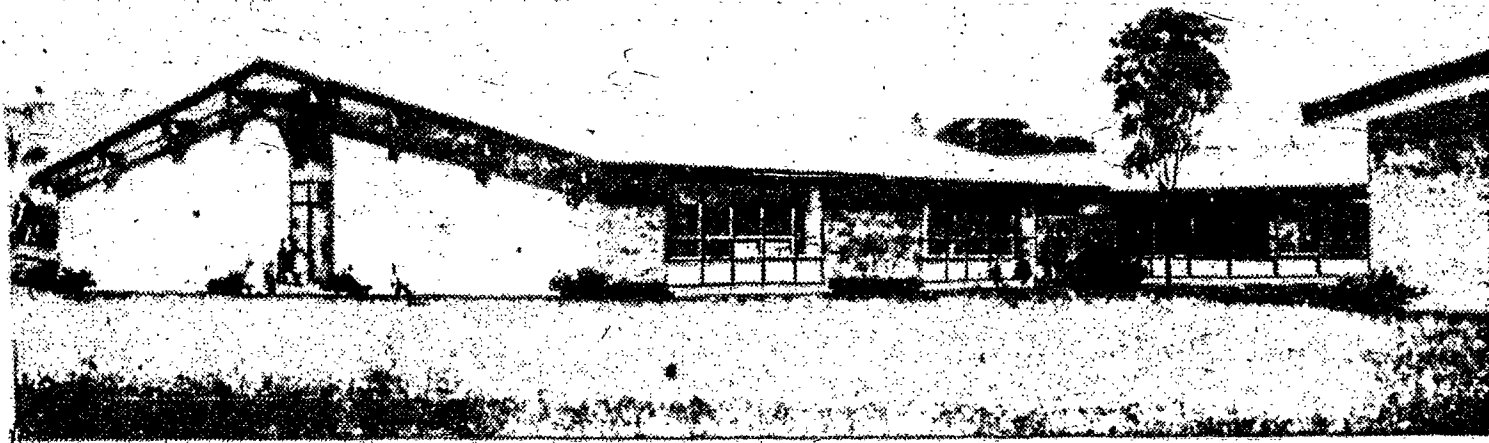

**St. Joseph's Parish**

**School Drive To Open In Penfield**

The Building Fund Campaign to finance construction of a school addition and a new rectory in St. Joseph Parish, Penfield will be opened by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casper at a kickoff dinner, Saturday, March 8 at 6 p.m. in the Country House, Penfield.

Campaign workers will attend Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in St. Joseph's Church at 4:15 p.m. Sunday, March 9 and general solicitation throughout the parish will take place from 7:45 to 9 p.m. according to the Rev. John Malley, pastor and honorary campaign chairman.

THE \$125,000 GOAL, primarily for the needed school addition, Father Malley said, but it is also expected the campaign will provide funds to build a rectory. The present rectory, at 1759 Penfield Road could then be turned over to the Sisters of Mercy teaching in the school.

Four classrooms and a utility room are to be provided in the addition, according to the plans of Waasdrop and Northrup, architects.

More than 200 men of the parish are enlisted in the campaign under the leadership of Dr. Victor J. Tofany, general chairman. The Rev. Andrew W. Teuchel is honorary vice chairman.

A special gifts committee dinner at which Monsignor Patrick J. Flynn, editor of the Catholic Courier Journal encouraged the workers was held, March 1 at the Hospitality House, Penfield. Special gifts chairman are John Odenbach and Richard Hayes.

Father Malley addressed the general committee at the school Feb. 21. He told of hardships endured by the Sisters teaching in the school. He said they are required now to live in a convent in a neighboring parish far from their school duties.

**St. Andrew's Sets Open House**

St. Andrew's Seminary will hold open house for prospective students and their parents this Sunday, March 9, 3 to 5 p.m.

The diocesan preparatory seminary is located at 1150 Buffalo Rd. about one mile west of Mt. Read Blvd.

Boys currently completing eighth grade studies or in high school are invited to visit the seminary to meet seminarians and faculty members.

A guided tour will be conducted through the seminary to show visitors the classrooms, library, gymnasium, cafeteria, study halls, and chapel.

COLORED SLIDES will also be shown illustrating life at the seminary.

Refreshments will be served. The afternoon program will conclude with a talk by Father Richard M. Quinn, rector, explaining the course of studies and activities at St. Andrew's. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will then be given in the seminary chapel.

Father Quinn said St. Andrew's provides a complete high school and junior college education to prepare students for St. Bernard's Seminary, the diocesan major seminary on Lake Ave. At St. Bernard's students complete their college studies and then continue with four years of theological training. The full twelve year course (six years at each seminary) climaxes with ordination to the Catholic priesthood.

ST. ANDREW'S has a current enrollment of 230 students, 90 of whom are in the two-year college department. A staff of 11 priests make up the faculty.

Most of the seminarians are from the Diocese of Rochester, but other dioceses are also represented, including Syracuse, New York.

"Special talks are given regularly to the students about the priesthood. There is also ample opportunity to talk over the subject privately with our spiritual director Father Louis Hohman or with any of the faculty members, all of whom are priests," Father Quinn said.

He stated chapel ceremonies, monthly days of recollection, an annual retreat and other special services help the students deepen their spiritual ideals.

The rector also said, "Our modern times demand a priest have more than piety. Pope Pius XII himself has repeatedly insisted that Catholic priests should have the most up-to-date, all-around education possible."

The St. Andrew's Seminary course of studies includes thorough academic training in English, mathematics, science, modern languages, social studies, besides Latin, Greek and advanced religion courses.
