Vatican City (AP) - L'Osservatore della Domenica, Vatican City weekly, deplored the French bombing of the Tunisian town of Sidi Sidi-Youssef earlier this month.

It termed the bombing, in which women and children were killed, "extreme" and noted that it has made solution of the Algerian problem more difficult. In addition, the paper said, it has "delivered a new blow at the solidarity of the western allies."

Lay Apostolate Lecture Draws Overflow Crowd

The first of a series of four Lenten lectures, sponsored by the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, drew an overflow crowd at the Catholic Evidence Library at the Columbus Civic Center last Monday.

Mrs. Theodore Strohmeyer, president of the council, said that next week's lecture, "Intellectual Formation," which will be given by the Rev. Joseph L. Hogan, will be given at Corpus Christi Parish Hall, Main St. E. and Prince St., at 8 p.m. Monday, March 10.

THE SERIES on the lay apostolate was begun Monday with a talk by the Rev. E. Leo McMannus, Father McMannus based his talk on an address given by His Holiness, Pope Pius XII last October to the second world congress of the lay apostolate.

In stressing the urgent need for the active support by the laity of the teaching authority of the church, Father McMannus pointed out that the idea of the laity as "the passive Church" is an erroneous concept. "The lay person," he said, "has a definite responsibility. Responsibility, apathy, intellectual sloth and sectarianism or ghetto Catholicism must be overcome by an ever widening effort to give oneself in love to all and for all that the Church of Jesus Christ may be brought to those who are missing."

Mrs. Strohmeyer spoke on the practical aspects of the lay apostolate. Mrs. Arthur Farren, chairman of the series, said that all women interested in attending the remaining lectures on March 10, 24 and 31 are most welcome. For registration call Mrs. Farren.
