

Mass League Membership Nears 5,000

With scores of applications coming in daily, membership in the Daily Mass League will soon be beyond the 5,000 mark before Easter, league promoters reported this week.

Enrollment has been increased each Lenten week as a result of a crusade being conducted by the league to develop increased interest in weekday Mass attendance and in the benefits of league membership.

ASSISTING in distribution of league pamphlets are branches of the Nocturnal Adoration Society and the Legion of Mary. Also being distributed are placards for display in church vestibules.

The Rev. Edward P. Callens, S.S.C., pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church and league spiritual director, said Tuesday that the organization has enrolled more than 4,600 members.

FATHER CALLENS pointed out that any practicing Catholic who has a genuine desire to attend Mass daily—even if unable to do so because of particular circumstances—is eligible. The league has no dues, officers, meetings or promises. Many special indulgences have been granted to league members by the Holy See.

Students To Hear Dr. George Carter

Dr. George F. Carter, professor at Johns Hopkins University, is the next speaker in Nazareth College's lecture series. He will speak to seniors and sophomores, March 21, at 11:30 a.m. All other students who are free at this hour are invited to attend as well as alumnae and friends of the college.

Dr. Carter is professor of Geography at Johns Hopkins. He holds his Ph.D. from the University of California, is listed in Who's Who, American Men of Science, and is a member of The American Association for the Advancement of Science.

As a student of the cultural development of societies, his primary laboratory is the American Indian. Much of his study has been devoted to the antiquity of man in America, the origins of American Indian agriculture, and the evidences of contact between the Old and the New World in pre-Columbian times. His latest book, Pleistocene Man at San Diego, presents evidence that man has been in America on the order of 100,000 years.

As a student of the Bible as well as an anthropologist, Dr. Carter has definite views about the supposed conflict between science and religion. He has a keen insight to the problems of the Catholic intellectual, and his lectures are an application of this insight to the questions of faith in our time.

Dr. Carter has lectured at

many Catholic colleges in the United States, including Mt. St. Vincent, Regis, Mary Mansel, Albertus Magnus, St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, St. John's Seminary, Little Rock, Rochester, he will also speak at St. Bernard's Seminary and at State Teachers College in Geneseo.

If a rewarding and sincere personality is to be developed, Miss Cullin believes, an understanding and appreciation of the true nature, dignity, and role of woman is necessary. She knows that a good character comes from many factors other than intelligence.
