For several years now, one of my militant Irish friends has remonstrated with me that I have not written a panegyric on St. Patrick for one of my columns in March. My reason for not having done so reflects not at all on my love or respect for the saint; I have not written a panegyric on St. Patrick because I try to avoid repetition and I know many others will write and speak on this subject in mid-March.

I was pleased to see in the current issue of a national magazine distributed by one of the large food chains a double page spread on St. Patrick and St. Brigid with an explanation of their place in Irish history and verses by Phyllis McGinley.

INFORMATION about St. Patrick seems much more readily available than it used to be. I recall having asked in a Catholic shop for a copy of his famous prayer and being told that I had to buy a book of prayers. Within the year I purchased from a Catholic shop a beautifully illustrated card carrying the heart of the famous prayer:

"Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger."

At this time of the year I sometimes wonder what there is about Ireland and her people that has made her so much better known in America than the missionaries to other lands.
