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Jesuits Get Bulk Of Woman's Estate

Buffalo (RNS) - The bulk of a \$529,704 gross estate was to Canisius High, a Jesuit school, left to three Jesuit institutions here, and the Jesuit Seminary and by a Catholic woman who died Mission Bureau of New York here in 1956.
