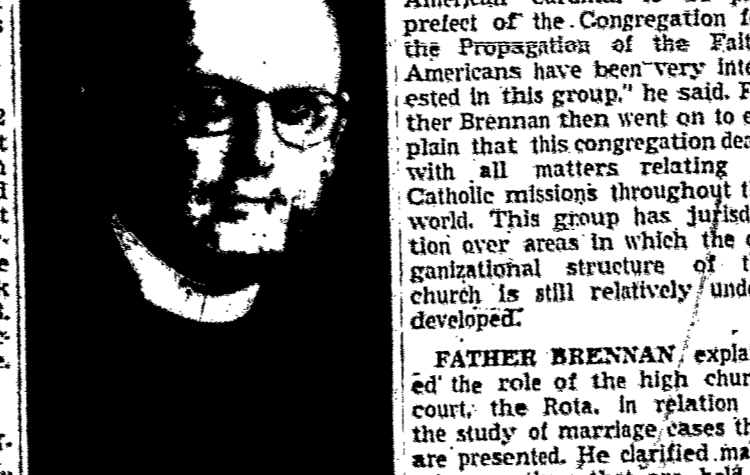

'Realize Civic Duties' Corning Knights Told

Corning — Speaking on "Civic Duties," Steuben County Dist. Atty. Ernest G. Peltz of Bath stressed the interdependence of racial groups in America as principal speaker at the annual St. Patrick's Day dinner of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, last Monday evening.

Held at the K of C home, the dinner was attended by 130 persons. It was preceded by a social hour and followed by a dancing party.

Introduced by Mayor George E. Keenan, toastmaster, the district attorney drew a sharp line between racial pride and racial tolerance.

"We all should have pride in our forebears," he said, "but America is the melting pot in which every group has equal rights and we, as Knights of Columbus, must realize the great responsibility that goes with the benefits and pleasures of citizenship."

"The day of telling our neighbors what to do has passed. We cannot hope to convert our enemies, the atheists and Communists, to the American way of life, but we can and must convert our friends in foreign nations. If we are to have world peace, the United States must accept its position of world leadership."

Slides On Mass Shown In Ithaca

Ithaca — Sunday evening the people attending the series on the History of the Mass in Immaculate Conception Church Parish Hall had the unique opportunity of seeing close-up views of the actions of a priest saying Mass.

Rev. Otto J. Vogt, who is giving the series of talks on the Mass, showed colored slides of the Mass in action. Father Vogt commented and explained the slides and gave the historical background of the parts and prayers of the Mass.

A QUESTION period followed the showing of the slides which emphasized the fact that during the consecration part of the Mass all Communion Hosts are consecrated—the ones for the laity as well as the one for the priest, and that Communion Hosts can be consecrated only at a Mass and at no other time.

Fourth and final talk on the Mass will be presented Sunday, March 30, at 8:15 p.m. in Parish Hall and the subject will be "The Mass and You" (practical aspects), and Holy Week Ceremonies will also be explained.
