Corning — Speaking on "Civic Duties," Steuben County Dist. Atty. Ernest G. Peltz of Bath stressed the interdependence of racial groups in America as principal speaker at the annual St. Patrick's Day dinner of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, last Monday evening.

"The day of telling our neighbors what to do has passed. We cannot hope to convert our enemies, the atheists and Communists, to the American way of life, but we can and must convert our friends in foreign nations. If we are to have world peace, the United States must accept its position of world leadership."

ATTORNEY PELTZ declared that civic teamwork is important today. Learning to get along with each other in the home, community, state, nation and world is "very important," Mr. Peltz went on to say.
