Entertainers Told Not To Advertise Faith

Albany — (RNS) — Catholic entertainers should not advertise their faith, a Franciscan priest said here.

The Rev. Edgar Holden, O.F.M. Conv., professor of theology at St. Anthony-on-Hudson in nearby Rensselaer, said it was "no great boon to the Church that we are able to 'see stars' among our numbers." He addressed the annual Communion breakfast of the State Labor Department's employment division.

"I AM pretty tired of holding my breath every time a theatrical personality lets it be known that he or she is a Catholic," Father Holden said. "And I am equally fed up with trying to look the other way when the same entertainer becomes a 'fallen star' in the eyes of the Church."

Referring to a "leading distract TV personality as the latest casualty," Father Holden cited an article in a recent issue of a widely-circulated Catholic magazine "which left the reader with the impression that 'here's a girl just short of a halo!'"

"While it is not up to us to sit in judgment on the state of a person's soul," Father Holden said, "might it not be better to adopt the wise policy of Mother Church? She canonizes saints only after their death."
