

Academy Nun Wins Fulbright Grant

Sister Cora Marie, S.S.J., teacher of Italian and citizenship education at Nazareth Academy, was awarded a Fulbright grant to participate in the Italian Language and Civilization Seminar in Florence, Italy, early in July, according to an announcement from the Department of State.



The seminar will be held at a site near Florence, where a seminar for Italian teachers of English will be conducted at the same time. Social activities, as well as lectures on methods of teaching a foreign language, will be organized in common for the two seminars.

THE SCHEDULE for American teachers includes a 4-week program of intensive study in Italian conversation, phonetics and literature, with lectures and discussions on selected aspects of Italian life and culture. This will be followed by a three-week program of organized individual travel and observation throughout Italy. Teachers will be expected to participate in a final examination and to prepare a final report in Italian, evaluating their experiences.

U.S. Makes Loan

Philadelphia—(RNS)—St. Joseph's College, conducted here by the Jesuits, has been granted a \$45,000 loan by the Community Facilities Administration of the U.S. Government.

The loan will augment college funds in financing a cafeteria for 650 students; faculty and student lounges and a college store and bookshop.

Sister has been pursuing graduate courses at Middlebury College, Vermont, during Summer sessions. Her European study will give graduate credit which may be applied for higher degrees in American universities. An alumna of Nazareth Academy and college, where she majored in Italian, Sister returned to Academy as a teacher in 1952.
