Former C-J Writer Edits New Magazine

The first issue of Critique, a review of theatre arts and dramatic literature, has made its debut under the auspices of National Catholic Theatre Conference. The magazine will be published three times yearly.

Robert D. Smett, executive secretary-treasurer of N.C.T.C. and former associate editor of the Courier-Journal, is editor of the new magazine. Associate editors

are Sister Mary Marguerite, R.S.M., Sister Mary Olive, S.P., and Sister Mary Xavier, B.V.M. Smett served on the staff of the Courier-Journal from September 1952 until he assumed his new duties in December 1952. He served as entertainment and theatre editor for the Courier and was active in various theatre

Catholic Theatre Magazine

Catholic Theatre magazine contains articles of technical and craft value and news notes on activities of member units and regions throughout the country. The Service Bureau has a lending library of more than 2,000 scripts with royalty reductions and a film library for audio-visual aids.

Smett's position as secretary-treasurer involves travel to various regions throughout the country to attend workshops, drama festivals and clinics. Plans are also underway for the first annual Catholic Players Workshop at Loyola University in Chicago from June 8-13. Promising young Catholic playwrights will be invited to the workshop free of charge and provided board to study under the guidance of leading playwrights.

The first issue of Critique contains an evaluation of playwright Eugene O'Neill by John Gassner, a study of American musical comedy by George Kernan, a comparable study of T. S. Eliot and Philip Barry by Donald Hugh Dickenson and an analysis of Graham Greene's "The Potting Shed" by Mrs. Christopher Wyatt, drama critic of the Catholic World.

A two color cover in a primitive motif was designed by James Donahue, founder and director of Allied Artists Studios in Detroit. A four page center spread is devoted to theatre architecture and features in the first issue the Fine Arts building at Marymount College in Salina, Kansas.

Subscriptions to Critique are \$3 a year to non-members and \$3.50 for two years. A package subscription of both Critique and Catholic Theatre is available for \$5 a year. Editorial offices are at 136 Sherwood Ave., Rochester, N.Y.
