

# Requiem Mass Said For Former Waverly Teacher

Waverly — Requiem Mass was celebrated on March 15, 1958 at St. James Church by the Rev. G. Stuart Hogan for Mary Muldoon of Waverly who died Wednesday, March 12, 1958, following a long illness.

Miss Muldoon, a school teacher and principal in the Waverly School system for 54 years, retired in 1949. The Mary Muldoon Junior high school was named after her.

A native of Horseheads, Miss Muldoon was the daughter of Michael and Elizabeth Muldoon. She started her teaching career at 16.

Surviving her are five sisters, Mrs. Charles Fitzpatrick of DuShore, Pa., Mrs. Michael Malone of Rahway, N.J., Lena Muldoon of Denville, N.J., Mrs. Walter Calhoun of Middlebury, Vt. and Winifred Muldoon of Waverly.

MISS MULDOON studied at Oswego State Teachers College and began her teaching in Waverly in the third grade. She later shifted to teaching geography in the central building under Anna Graft and became principal in 1920.

She became the first principal of the Junior high school in 1927 and remained there until her retirement.

In addition to her teaching in Waverly, Miss Muldoon rates Regents examination papers in Albany, was a Summer course instructor at Oswego, taught a special course at Ohio State University and taught three years in the state center for industrial teachers in New York City.

Miss Muldoon was also the originator of a state retirement fund for teachers that now has more than \$300,000 and is called the Mary W. Muldoon Welfare Fund after its founder.

Among her interests were the Waverly Red Cross, which she joined during World War I and continued as a director thru the Second World War; the Community Chest, of which she was one of the original board of directors; the Community Council and the Business and Professional Women's Club.

Miss Muldoon wrote the material for the Waverly centennial as well as many pamphlets and books. She was a Waverly historian. She was one of the few members of the State Teachers Association.

In the Sanctuary at the funeral Mass was a cousin, Rev. John Maloney of Elmira. Recitation of the Rosary was conducted Friday at the Luckner Funeral Home in Waverly by Father Hogan. Burial was in St. James Cemetery with Father Maloney.

# Dedicate New St. Patrick's

Bishop Kearney told worshippers at St. Patrick's Church, Macedon, that the new church edifice is, unlike some contemporary churches, "a church of God."

Bishop Kearney, who preached at the Pontifical Low Mass after the dedication ceremony for the new St. Patrick's Church, said that the people of the parish were specially fortunate to have their church completed prior to the celebration of the feast of their Patron Saint, St. Patrick.

"You have a beautiful place in which to pay homage to God and to St. Patrick," Bishop Kearney said.

"I want to pay special tribute to the architect who designed the building and also to Father Hanna and you good people who have made this beautiful church become reality," he added.

Bishop Kearney also said that the portrait of St. Patrick in the Sanctuary was a thing of beauty. He told the congregation the story of the lighting of the first Easter candle in the Emerald Isle.

THE TRADITIONAL lines of the church were also praised by Bishop Kearney as he told the people how much the new church should mean to each one as a place of worship.

Bishop Kearney was escorted by the leaders of the Seventh District, New York State Department, American Legion.

Father Bernard C. Hanna, pastor of St. Patrick's, received messages of congratulations from Cardinals Mooney and Spellman as well as one from President Eisenhower, which follows:

"To the members and friends of St. Patrick Church assembled at the dedication of their new house of worship, I send greetings.

"By faith and work you have accomplished much together now. As you enter into the use of this building, I am sure you will continue to advance the services of God and neighbor. Congratulations and best wishes."
