

Catholic University Offers Fellowships

A number of graduate fellowships for the academic year 1958-59 were established by the Board of Trustees of The Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. according to Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. McDonald, rector.

The action was taken by the Board, Monsignor McDonald said, in the light of the need for more extensive graduate study and of the many appeals from students for financial aid for graduate study.

The new fellowships will be in addition to the more than 100 fellowships and scholarships, full and partial, offered annually for graduate study at the University.

Each of the new fellowships is valued at \$1,500 for the academic year, and covers tuition, board and room on the campus of the University. They will be for graduate work in social science, social work or in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, preferably in physics, chemistry, mathematics, psychology and anthropology.

Catholic War Veterans Hold Communion Breakfast

Principal speaker at the annual corporate communion breakfast of St. Patrick's Post No. 1286, Catholic War Veterans last Sunday was Rogers Murphy of Kingston, N. Y. A past commander of St. Sebastian Post of West Hempstead, N.Y., Murphy is the second vice commander, department of New York.

Members of the post, together with members of other C.W.V. posts in the county, received Communion at the 8:30 Mass at

St. Patrick's Church, after which the address was given by Commander Murphy in the church hall.

"The Catholic War Veterans are dedicated to a program of united action to promote the welfare of all veterans, joining hands with other veteran organizations wherever and when ever through increased prestige we can influence public opinion, promote good laws and improve the lot of the veterans," he said. "We are pledged to an out and out fight against atheistic communism and all other forms foreign to our American form of government. We are established to promote zeal and devotion for God, for country, for home."

COMMENTING ON the current de-emphasis of American history and government from school curricula, Murphy added: "Perhaps the greatest evil existing in America today is the complete lack of knowledge among citizens relative to the history and government of the American people. This distressing situation was clearly demonstrated some years ago before the House of American Activities Committee. Since it is apparent that many of our educational institutions have seen fit to delete the study of American history from the curriculum, it is incumbent upon the Catholic War Veterans to prepare its Americanism program to meet the need on the community level."

He urged each post to develop active Americanism programs to insure the civic health of the community. He pointed out the current threat of subversive forces in our schools and the need for the post's active interest in legislation concerning veterans affairs. Chairman of the event was Michael Del Vecchio; toastmaster was past county commander Macio Ferrari.
