

Cathedral Lists Holy Week Rites, Parish Retreat

Holy Week will be observed with the full solemnity of the Church's impressive liturgy at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey, rector, announced today.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will climax the Holy Week observance by celebrating solemn pontifical Mass Easter Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m.

A Holy Week Retreat beginning Palm Sunday evening, March 31, will be conducted by Rev. Norman Kelly, C.P. Services Sunday through Wednesday will be held at 7:45 p.m. with Father Kelly as preacher.

There will also be an afternoon Mass at 5:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

CONFESSIONS will be heard daily after retreat services, Monday, Tuesday and Holy Thursday from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m.; Monday through Wednesday, 7 to 7:20 a.m.; Wednesday afternoon, 3:30 to 5 p.m.; and 7:30 to 9 p.m.; Holy Thursday evening and Good Friday evening after services, and again Holy Saturday, 3:30 to 6 p.m. and 7:30 to 9 p.m.

MUSIC for the Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil services and the Easter afternoon Pontifical Mass will be furnished by the St. Bernard's Seminary Choir. The students of St. Bernard's will also conduct the services.

Solemn pontifical Mass of the blessing of the Holy Oils, Bishop Kearney, celebrant, 9 a.m. Holy Communion will not be given at this Mass.

Solemn pontifical Mass of the Last Supper, Bishop Casey, celebrant, 7:45 p.m. Father Kelly, preacher. Procession to the Repository after this Mass.

Low Masses at 7 a.m. and 8:30 p.m.

Holy Communion will be given at these three Masses. Devotions at the Repository will begin after the Last Supper Mass.

The Cathedral will remain open through Thursday night for private visits.

No morning services. Stations of the Cross, 1:45 p.m. Sermon by Father Kelly at 2:10 p.m.

Solemn liturgy commemorating the passion and death of our Lord, 2:30 p.m. Bishop Casey, celebrant. Holy Communion will be given during this solemn liturgy at approximately 3:45 p.m.

Veneration of the relic of the true Cross will be held during the afternoon and evening services.

Stations of the Cross, Sermon by Father Kelly, and Benediction with Relic of the True Cross, 7:45 p.m.

Holy Saturday

No morning services. Easter Vigil will begin at 10:45 p.m. and conclude with solemn pontifical Mass at midnight, the first Mass of Easter. Church doors open at 10:15 p.m.

Easter Sunday
Morning Low Masses will be celebrated at 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11:15 and 12:15.

Solemn pontifical Mass, Bishop Kearney, celebrant, 4 p.m. Sermon at Easter Masses by Father Kelly.

Palm Sunday will be blessed and the solemn procession honoring Christ the King will take place this Sunday at the 10:45 a.m. solemn High Mass.

Evening retreat services will be held at 7:45 p.m.

Rev. Mgr. John E. Maney, Corpus Christi administrator, also announced that on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, of Holy Week, Masses will be said at 8:30, 7 and 8 a.m., 12:10 noon, and 7:45 p.m. Confessions will be heard at all Masses. Father Gorman will preach at the evening Masses.

Holy Thursday—Low Masses at 7 a.m. and 5:15 p.m. Solemn Mass of the Last Supper, 7:45 p.m.; followed by private adoration at the Repository until midnight. Confessions will be heard in the afternoon from 4 p.m.

Good Friday—Solemn Liturgy commemorating the sufferings and death of our Lord, 2:30 p.m., with Holy Communion at 3:45 p.m. Stations of the Cross and Benediction with the Relic of the True Cross, 7:45 p.m. Confessions will be heard following evening services.

Holy Saturday—Confessions 4 to 6 and 7:30 to 9 p.m.; Easter Vigil, 10:30 p.m. with solemn Easter Mass at midnight.

Easter Sunday—Low Masses at 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 12:15 a.m.; Solemn Mass at 11 a.m. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, 5 p.m.

Annual Nocturnal Breakfast

Bishop Lauds Adoration Men

Bishop Kearney told members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society that it was "probably through their monthly adoration to the Blessed Sacrament that resulted in the increased devotion to the Holy Eucharist and great increase of the reception of Holy Communion."

Bishop Kearney was the guest speaker at the annual Communion Breakfast of the society, held last Sunday at the Bausch & Lomb cafeteria, St. Paul St.

NOCTURNAL members had previously received Communion at the Adoration centers of Sacred Heart Cathedral, Blessed Sacrament, St. Monica's and St. Andrew's Churches.

Guests of honor at the breakfast were Bishop Lawrence B. Casey, Rt. Rev. Msgrs. Thomas F. Connors, George W. Eckl and Gerald C. Lambert, Rev. Leo C. Mooney and Carl S. Hallauer, president of Bausch & Lomb.

Bishop Kearney said that the Nocturnal Adoration Society "is a unique organization." He said that its title displays its character and the Bishop also traced the history of the "Silence in the Night" tradition that the society has adopted.

"We first find this tradition in the conception of the Christ Child in the darkness of the night," Bishop Kearney said. "This is continued in the birth of the Child when the Angels announced to the shepherds the birth of the Child in the night-time."

FOLLOWING THIS trend of thought His Excellency told the crowd of 1200 men that "Christ retired at night to communicate with His Father. It was also at night when Christ suffered in the Garden of Gethsemane."

"At the time Christ died, the earth turned into a darkness as deep as the night, even though it was a bright Spring day only minutes before," the Bishop related, "which gave dignity and importance to the things of night."

"It is also night that sin is associated with," he added. "But it is you men who worship in silence at night that offer reparation for the sins that are being committed while you pray."

"It is at night that you men establish the close contact to God, with your soul communing."

with God's soul. The very fact that you disregard the hardships involved in making this monthly meeting with God shows that it is not alone personal reparation but a world-wide act of reparation for the sins of mankind."

BISHOP KEARNEY also told the men that the Church worship is no longer a day time proposition. Through the economic necessities and through man's inventions, Pope Pius XII was able to schedule evening Masses and increased devotion at night.

"It is up to you men to pray for those who will not pray for themselves," Bishop Kearney concluded. "By doing this, you are fulfilling the command of God to 'Love thy God with thy whole heart thy whole soul and thy whole mind and to love thy neighbor as thyself.'"

Chairman for the breakfast was Robert H. Kalb. He was assisted by members of the central committee, headed by Joseph W. Bein, executive secretary.

The Bishop concluded the breakfast with Benediction.

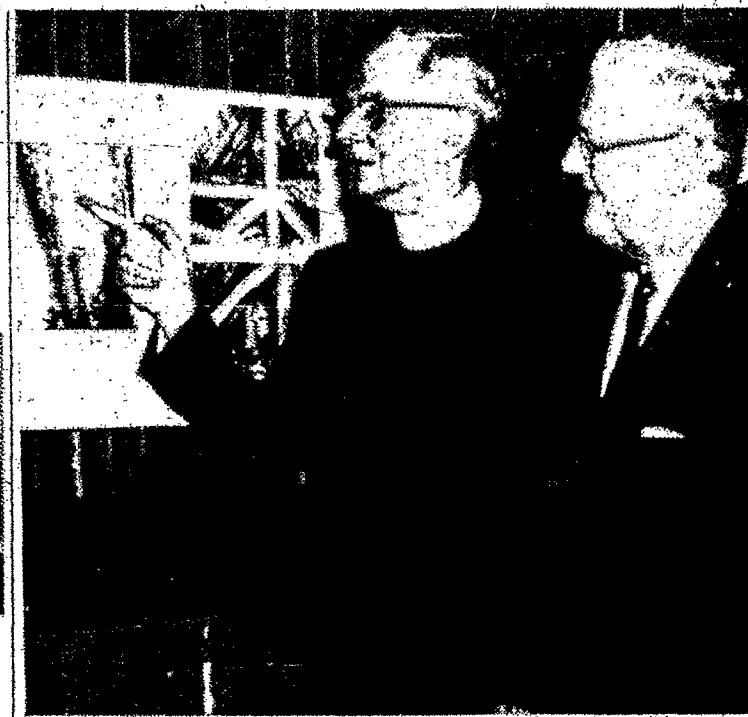
First Friday Club Slates Moderator

St. Boniface Plans Traditional Church

The new St. Boniface Church to rise on the site of the fire wrecked edifice on Gregory St., Rochester, will be "traditional" in style, Father Walter Kohl announced today.

Architect Joseph P. Flynn is currently at work drawing up plans for the proposed church.

CONSTRUCTION will begin as soon as the ruins of the old church can be removed, he said.

Men of the parish at a meeting last Wednesday looked over pictures of churches recently constructed in various styles throughout the country.

Father Kohl said the majority favored what architects term "modified Gothic" as the style for the new St. Boniface.

The new church will cost an estimated \$350,000. Demolition of the old structure, ruined by a disastrous fire last November, will cost an additional \$30,000.

The pastor said there will be "no new campaign" to pay for the new construction.

St. Boniface parishioners conducted a fund drive earlier last year to renovate the historic south Rochester landmark in May 3.

preparation of the parish centennial in 1959.

"If we have 100 per cent results from that campaign and generous help from the newcomers to our parish, we can have our new church," Father Kohl said. He also said the construction costs would put the parish about \$100,000 in debt.
