Bishop To Mary's Legion

God's Love Seen Lourdes' Message

"The message of Lourdes is a double message," Bishop James E. Kearney told members of the Legion of Mary at their annual rededication ceremony on Passion Sunday at St. Margaret Mary's Church, Rochester.

"It is the message of the Divine Compassion of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Affection of the Immaculate Heart of Mary," the Bishop said.

Over 1100 members of the Legion of Mary, whose members do work of the lay apostolate, were gathered in the church for the annual ceremony, called an Actus to hear the Ordinary of the Rochester Diocese.

BISHOP KEARNEY said that there have been many messages attributed to the Apparition of the Blessed Virgin at Lourdes, France. These include the "plea for penance by Our Lady," the

transcendent power of Our Lady before the Throne of "God" and the power of the Rosary, which Our Lady said with St. Bernadette.

"But the message of Lourdes can be summed up into this double message," he said.

"What has gone on at Lourdes during the past 100 years is a result of the divine manifestation of the Sacred Heart of the Virgin Mary and the appearance of the stream of water that has such miraculous healing qualities was part of the plan given to Our Lady by her Divine Son. But the healing done at Lourdes is only partly known.

The healing of the body ills we know about but the miracles of Divine Grace are the ones that count, where people accept their burdens by bowing to the will of God," he added.

"We all know that by praying directly to God, our prayers will be answered, but He has given His Virgin Mother the responsibility for our care. We need no further evidence than Lourdes to show that He chooses to dispense His favors through Her. This is the second part of the double message of Lourdes.

"You members of the Legion of Mary have chosen Mary to tell you to do the things that she knows God wants you to do. She draws His Divine Grace to support your works," the Bishop added.

"It is only when you get out on an aggressive campaign that you realize your own weakness. It is then that Our Lady obtains the graces to help you do your work.

"I feel this year that the Mother of God will shower down upon you special graces obtained from her Divine Son, this being the hundredth anniversary of her apparition at Lourdes. This will help you carry out the program that God has laid out for you.

"It will be through these special graces that you will once again be able to work out your projects this year with your efforts being blessed by the Compassionate Heart of Mary under the Divine Manifestation of the Sacred Heart," the Bishop concluded.

The program included the recitation of the Rosary, the individual act of consecration by each active Legionary, a group recitation by auxiliary members, recitation of the Magnificat and concluded with benediction of

The Blessed Sacrament and singing of the hymn, "Holy God."

Mr. Switzer, 61, national manager of retail sales for Shell Oil Co. until his retirement from active duty about three years ago, died March 15, 1938 in Broward General Hospital, Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

The Mass was offered by the Rev. James Crowley, a Franciscan Friar from Wilkesbarre, Pa., and a first cousin of Mr. Switzer assisted by the Rev. Robert M. Egan, deacon and the Rev. Conrad Sandholm, subdeacon. Also in the Sanctuary were Monsignor Thomas F. Connors, Monsignor Leslie G. Whalen and Rev. William T. Nolan.

Mr. Switzer who traveled extensively for the Shell Oil Co. enjoyed the acquaintance of oil industry officials in nearly every city in the country.

Five years ago in Europe, he represented the American point of view in a series of meetings designed to analyze and improve distribution methods for auto fuels and petroleum products.

In 1929 Mr. Switzer served as exalted ruler of Rochester Lodge of Elks, youngest to hold the position, locally and believed youngest in entire order.

He is survived by two sisters, Miss Marie V. Switzer and Mrs. John D. Roche.

Burial was in St. Bonaventure Cemetery, Olean.

Entrance examinations for prospective students of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary will be given in five cities of the Diocese.

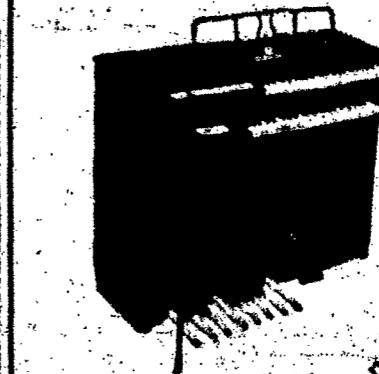
Rochester area students will take their test at the seminary, 1150 Buffalo Rd., Saturday, March 29, at 10 a.m.
