WITH A TWO-HOUR office class each day, during which they work on their faculty bosses' jobs, the girls gain much more from doing these actually-needed projects than they would from doing routine "business busy-work" from a textbook.

Every skill they learn from taking dictation on a dictaphone through running the various multi-copy machines is brought into play on one assignment or another.

In addition to these personal tasks for teachers, the office class also performs valuable services for the school as a whole — checking, typing and duplicating lists, setting up addressograph plates and sending out special invitations for school functions, such as they are now doing for the senior play to be presented April 16.

Learning to work from directions and to be alone responsible for accurate results are achievements as valuable to them as the actual techniques they acquire; therefore, everyone profits — the students, their future employers, and their teachers.

Nazareth Biologists Hear Two Eminent Scientists

Members of the biology club at Nazareth College heard two eminent scientists at meetings held during the past week.

The club members heard Dr. Johannes Holtfreder, professor of zoology at the University of Rochester talk on experiments in amphibian embryology last Friday. Dr. Holtfreder is an internationally known zoologist and an authority on animal cell phenomena.

Dr. Terrence Rogers of the University of Rochester Physiology Department, spoke at a meeting of the biology club of St. John Fisher College, to which Nazareth students were invited. Dr. Rogers talked on "Some topics in physiological research."

To Give Paper

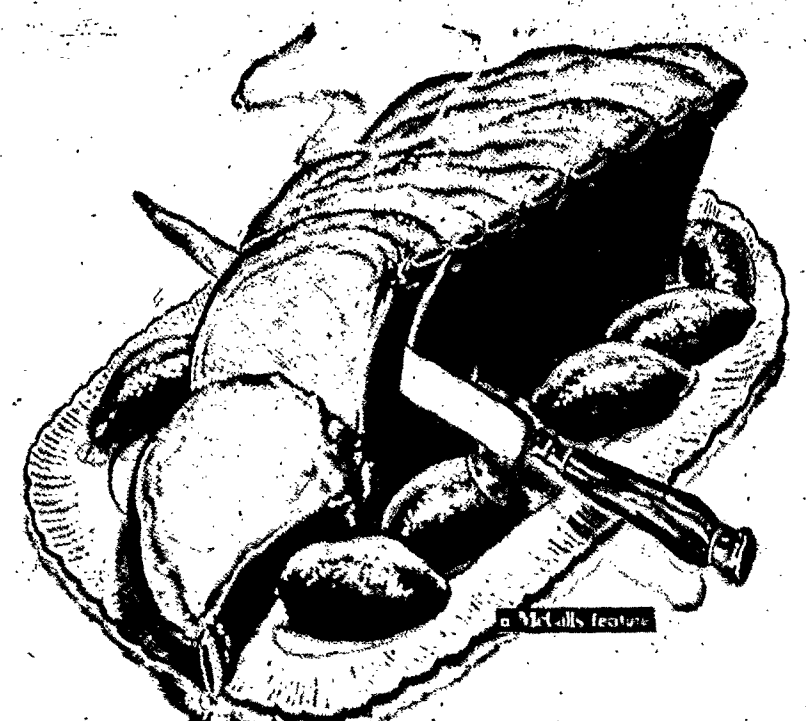
