## Diocesan Director At National Conference

Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, director of the Catholic Youth Organization in Rochester, will be among the more than 150 priests and Catholic laymen who will take part in the 15th National Conference of Diocesan Scout Chaplains in New York April 9 and 10.

Meeting under the theme of "Onward for God and My Country—How the priests and laymen will discuss means of making the program of the Boy Scouts of America more effective in the lives of Catholic boys.

At a dinner on April 9 at the Park Lane Hotel, Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, will present the St. George Award to General Carlos P. Romulo, Philippine Ambassador to the United States. Ambassador Romulo will address the dinner.

## Nazareth College Starts New Dormitory Construction

Construction of a new \$850,000 dormitory for resident students of Nazareth College began this week on the 200 acre East Ave. campus. The new building will provide facilities for 134 additional students.

The new building will be similar in construction to Medallie Hall, the main dormitory, and connected to it by a passageway. The building will be three stories high with the left wing providing dining facilities for 270 students.

LIVING QUARTERS will consist principally of double rooms with built-in wardrobes and chests. Recreation facilities will be provided on the ground floor.

Existing residence halls, consisting of the main dormitory, the senior house and two freshmen houses, can accommodate 148 students. The present enrollment of 185 boarders has necessitated the use of temporary housing for 40 students.

With an expected enrollment of 275 residents in 1959, rising to an estimated 350 by 1960 and 500 by 1965, the college secured an \$810,000 loan from the Housing and Home Finance Agency to provide additional housing.

Advance registrations for next year will more than half fill the new dormitory according to the faculty. Temporary housing will be used until the new building is ready for occupancy around January 1, 1959.

## Bishop Lists Afternoon Mass

On Easter Sunday afternoon, His Excellency Bishop Kearney will celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral beginning at 4 p.m.

This will be the Bishop's first Solemn Pontifical Mass on the afternoon of Easter Day and it will bring to a climax the solemn observance of the Resurrection in the Diocese of Rochester. St. Bernard's Seminary Choir will provide the music.

ALL CHURCHES of this Diocese will climax the observance of Lent with impressive Easter Vigil rites scheduled for late this Holy Saturday night.

Mass at midnight Saturday will conclude the Easter Vigil ceremonies.

Striking feature of the Easter Vigil will be renewal of baptismal vows by congregations in candle lighted churches.

Holy Saturday ceremonies, previous to 1856 were observed in most churches on Saturday morning. This year, Holy Saturday rites will be held in the evening beginning at 10:30 or 11 p.m. as scheduled by individual pastors.

Congregations will be urged to sing the responses and other chants of the Vigil service and Mass in accord with the recently revised directions for Holy Week ceremonies.

THE HOUR LONG rites preceding the midnight Mass will include blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, symbols of Christ rising from the dead. Water will be blessed for use at baptism and the litany of the saints will be chanted.

All ceremonies are to be conducted in such a way that the people will see and understand them.

Many pastors have arranged to have a priest in the pulpit to explain the rites while other priests conduct the ceremony in the sanctuary.

Holy Saturday will be marked as a day of fast and abstinence until midnight. Those bound to fast may eat meat once on that day. Those not obliged to fast may eat meat more than once.

THERE WILL be no church services on Holy Saturday morning.

Confessions will be heard Saturday afternoon and evening in preparation for Easter Communion.

Catholics desiring to receive Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil Mass are required to fast three hours from solids and one hour from liquids.
