

Holy Childhood Fund Drive Opens

Please give!
This is the cry of the retarded children at the School of the Holy Childhood, which opens a drive for funds today, Monday. A drive that will carry through April 21.

The school, under the supervision of the Diocesan Superintendent of Schools, and, therefore, ineligible for financial help from the Community Chest, trains children from 7 to 18 years of age, without regard to their religion, race or ability to pay.

FATHER WOOD THE COST to the school is about \$200 per year for each student to give them special attention. In most cases, the families of these children can only afford a token amount. So the tuition has to be raised by other means.

That the school has been successful can be attested to in many cases.

In the educable group, one of the two groups at the school and whose I.Q. is between 50 and 80, many have gone on to become successful in such occupations as, barbering and beautician work.

IN FACT, some of the beauticians work is on exhibition in New York City. Also, several graduates of the school have become members of the Armed Forces. This, in spite of the fact that they were not able to get past the fourth grade, their mental level.

In addition, the older boys in the school undertake the entire maintenance work in the school, under the supervision of Mrs. Joseph Hebert.

As to the other group. These people will always be dependant on somebody else, to a varying degree.

For them, the training consists of giving them self assurance so that they can socialize with other children and get along on fairly even terms with others of comparable mental age.

They all respond to accomplishment. That is why their Christmas play is so important to them. They learn their parts months ahead so that when they go on stage, they can get this feeling of being "liked."

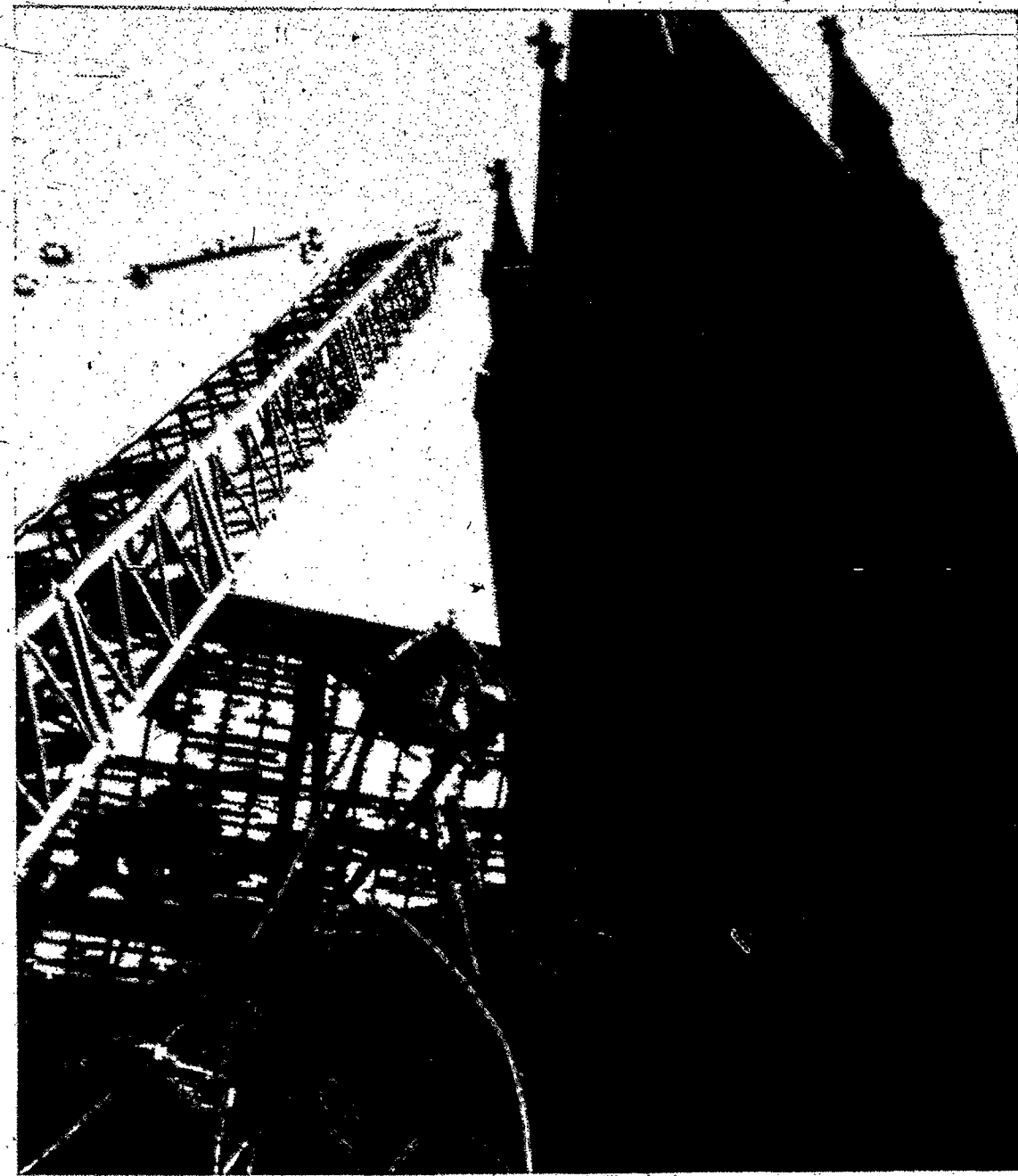
TO MAKE SURE that these mentally immature children are given this insurance, the entire play is taped. When they go on stage, they act out the play as the tape is played to the audience.

This insures no stage fright, and thus embarrassment to the children.

Their pride of accomplishment on having put on a good play can never be equalled by a Broadway actor.

It is for this reason that the school is hoping for financial help from the people of Rochester. Help to pay the \$30,000 a year needed to run the school.

Annual Tea Set For Girl Scouts

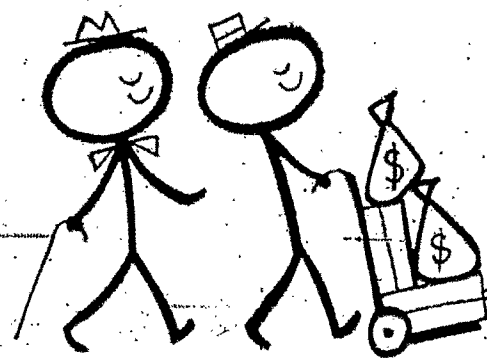
