As St. Paul says: "There are diversities of graces, but the same spirit. And the manifestation of the Spirit is given to every man unto profit. To one is given the word of wisdom, to another the word of knowledge: to another, faith in the same spirit; to another, the grace of healing; to another, prophecy; to another, the discerning of spirits; to another, diverse kind of tongues; to another, the interpretation of speeches. But all these things one and the same spirit worketh, dividing to every one according as he will."




