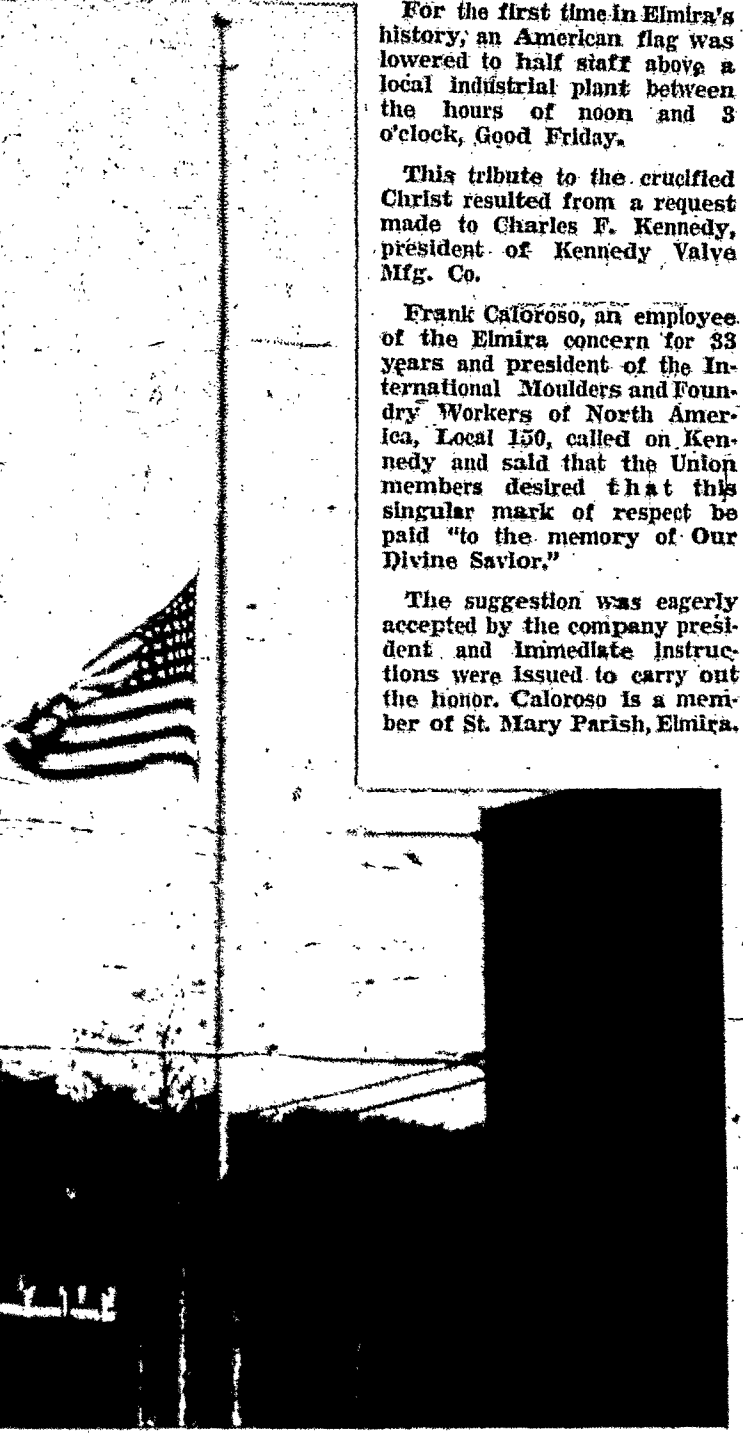


Factory Flag Notes Good Friday



For the first time in Elmira's history, an American flag was lowered to half staff above a local industrial plant between the hours of noon and 3 o'clock, Good Friday.

This tribute to the crucified Christ resulted from a request made to Charles F. Kennedy, president of Kennedy Valve Mfg. Co.

Frank Caloroso, an employee of the Elmira concern for 33 years and president of the International Molders and Foundry Workers of North America, Local 150, called on Kennedy and said that the Union members desired that this singular mark of respect be paid "to the memory of Our Divine Savior."

The suggestion was eagerly accepted by the company president and immediate instructions were issued to carry out the honor. Caloroso is a member of St. Mary Parish, Elmira.

Workshop For Senior Nursing Students Set

Plans are being completed by Area II, New York State Student Nurses Association for a workshop for senior students to be held April 24, at Dum Memorial Nurses Residence, St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira.

The workshop is being held in order to present to the senior nursing students of the area the various types of positions that are available to them following graduation. Included in this workshop will be a keynote talk by Esther Thompson, dean of the School of Nursing, University of Rochester, and president of the New York State Graduate Nurses Association.

A PANEL of local nurses employed in various types of nursing will be held and moderated by Sister Marie Michael, educational director of St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing. Representatives of the three areas — Army Nurses Corps, Navy Nurse Corps and Air Force Nurse Corps, will also be present.

Map Campaign For School Fund Drive At St. Mary's

Horseheads — More than 150 committee lieutenants in a campaign for construction of the first parochial school in this area will meet at 8 p.m. Francis J. Reilly, pastor of St. Mary's Church, announced. The meeting will be held in the parish hall.

Parishwide solicitation of pledges toward the new building, slated for completion by Sept., 1969, will be conducted Sunday, Apr. 27, Father Reilly said. Advanced gifts will be sought April 20. Minimum goal is \$100,000.

PLANS CALL for erection of a one-story building containing eight classrooms and an auditorium gymnasium, seating 500. The proposed building will be located on a newly-purchased eight-acre site on West Broad Street nearly a mile west of the present church and rectory at 408 W. Broad St.

The auditorium, the pastor noted, not only will serve as an assembly, cafeteria and recreation facility for the school children, but also will be available for extra Sunday Masses in order to relieve increasingly overcrowded conditions in the small church.

Industry President To Receive Degree

St. Bonaventure, N.Y.—John B. O'Connor, president of Dresser Industries, Inc., with headquarters in Dallas, Texas, will be awarded an honorary doctorate degree by St. Bonaventure University on May 1.

Granting of the degree to O'Connor will highlight a day-long business symposium on campus in connection with the university's observance of its centennial. The degree will be conferred at a special convocation at 11 a.m. in the university dining hall.

One of O'Connor's most distinctive claims to fame is his reputation as the world's most traveled executive. He has been in practically every country in the world, including Siberia.

He has many firsts to his credit, among them the development of the high speed engine-driven engine compressor for oil field service. He built the first complete gas liquefaction plant in Russia.

Scholarship Exam At Notre Dame High

Scholarship examinations at Notre Dame High school are set for Saturday, April 19 from 9 a.m. until noon, at the school.

The tests covering English and arithmetic based on the 7th and 8th grades syllabus are open to pupils in the upper half of their class in elementary schools.

First prize is a full four year tuition scholarship valued at \$600; next two highest will each receive a two year tuition scholarship, each valued at \$300. The fourth highest will be awarded a one year scholarship valued at \$150.

St. Bonaventure Band, Chorus At Notre Dame High School On Sunday

The music of Grieg, Chopin, Offenbach and Romberg will be featured in the 16-selection program for the April 13 variety show appearance of the St. Bonaventure University concert band and male chorus at Notre Dame High School.

Announcement of the selections was made recently by Jerome F. Hogan, show general chairman, of the sponsoring Msgr. John J. Lee Division, Ancient Order of Hibernians.

The show will open Sunday, April 13, at 3 p.m. with "Orpheus Overture" by Offenbach, played by the 35-piece concert band.

OTHER NUMBERS by the band include the "March of the Little Leaden Soldiers" by Piernave; the second suite of "The Carnival of the Animals" by Saint-Saens; Klöhr's "The Billboard March" and "The Slavonic Folk Suite" by Reed.

Band selections with featured solos are the first movement of Grieg's "Piano Concerto in A Minor" with Linda Cornell as soloist; "Trumpeter's Lullaby" by Anderson, with Leonard Fontana as soloist; "Ballade" by Reed, a saxophone solo by Wayne Keeler.

The 35-voice male chorus will present "Stouthearted Men" by Romberg; "Aderamus Te" by Palestrina; "I Love A Parade" by Arlen, and "Lost Chord" by Sullivan.

"Memories" by Van Alstyne; "Little David, Play On Yo' Harp" arranged by Lewis; and "Battle Hymn of the Republic" by Howe-Steffe.

Also included in the two-hour program is a piano medley of Chopin, with Thomas Banick the soloist.

The band and chorus are directed by the Rev. Paul J. Olgny, OFM, head of the department of music at St. Bonaventure.

THE TROUPE will be making its final stop here after a tour of New York State, which includes stops at Buffalo, Rochester and the Veterans Administration Hospital at Bath.
