Annual Art Exhibit

Art Students Display Work

The future Rembrandts of Nazareth College's art department will display their creations next weekend.

The exhibit, under the direction of Sister Magdalen, chairman of the college's art department, is done annually to show the work of Nazareth graduates, but will also include the work of some promising undergraduates.

Among the exhibitors will be Aljean Lemke, Moya Neville, Carol Srokose and Sister M. Marcella Conorton, S.S.I.

In addition to the paintings, the exhibit will also display drawings, crafts, jewelry, ceramics, prints, design, fabrics and sculpture.

THE NAZARETH art students in their four-year college course take not only the theory, philosophy and history of art, but also studio courses providing practical experience and experimentation in all the major art areas.

These include both two and three dimensional design, painting in water color, enamel and oil, graphic arts with experience in wood cuts, serigraphy and etching.

Nazareth art graduates are prepared and eligible for New York State certification to

teach art on either the elementary, junior high or senior high school level, or to accept positions in the field of commercial art. Nazareth is the only college in the Rochester area which prepares art teachers.

Movies, TV Seen

San Francisco (RNS) A citizens committee appointed by the governor has charged that crime movies, comic books and violent television shows are contributing factors in juvenile delinquency.

Delinquency-Factor

The advisory committee submitted a 53-page report to state Attorney General Edmund G. Brown. It cited "the number of hours devoted to serials, crime, aggressive behavior and over-emphasis of sex" put on television among the sources of delinquency.

The 50-member committee said "the television industry has a greater obligation to the public to maintain high standards because of its access to millions of homes." The group recommended a legislative investigation of TV crime pictures.

IN COUNTY CLARE, she remembered, it was customary to teach the young knitter on a pair of pointed and polished goose quills. Then as soon as the art of knitting had been mastered, the youthful knitter was entitled to the tools of the master workman and was presented with a set of steel knitting needles.
