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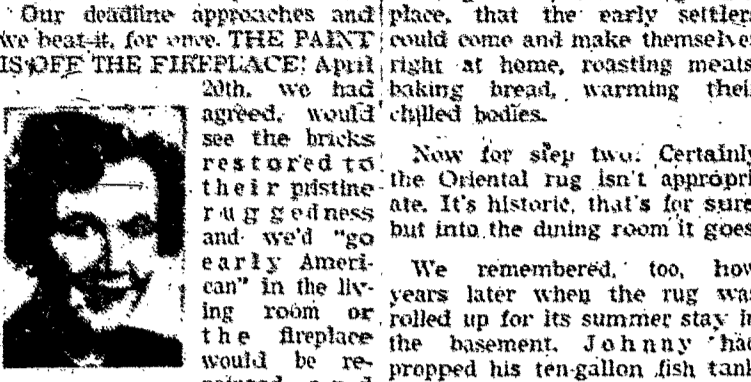

Freedom in these States is still on the side of the angels of light even if the angels of darkness seem to have their day. In the teaching of Christ there is dignity in the human person, sacredness in sex, spirituality and immortality in the human soul. But there is no dignity in those who exploit what is holy and sacred, and try to kill what is immortal."

"The Dominican Tertiary of our day must be an apostolic member of Christ's Mystical Body, the Church. Any other sort of Tertiary is unthinkable. Any other sort of Catholic is unthinkable."
