

Lady Of Good Counsel Devotion Story Told

"The history of the Miraculous Image of Our Lady of Good Counsel" was discussed by Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, Executive Director of Catholic Family Service at Chemung-Schuyler County Deanery of the National Council of Catholic Women meeting.

Miss Eva Mott, a sophomore at Notre Dame High School and a French Exchange Student, spoke briefly on "My Impressions of America."

The musical program included solos and duets by Mrs. Daniel F. Kennedy and John K. Dineen, accompanied by Mrs. Joseph P. O'Neill. Miss Mary McCanna, Chairman of the Spiritual Development Committee, was in charge of the program which was followed by a Coffee Hour for which Mrs. Catherine Ervin made the arrangements.

MISS FITZGERALD said in part: "It was from a little town in Italy, called Genazzano and located about twenty miles from Rome, that the devotion of Our Lady of Good Counsel spread, first through Italy and then over the entire world."

"The history of the original image is a story of miracles but it is also an indication of how much God's Holy Mother loves to be honored under the title of Our Lady of Good Counsel."

"It was on the afternoon of April 25, 1467 which was then the Feast Day of Our Lady of Good Counsel and of St. Mark, the Evangelist, that an immense crowd were waiting outside the little dilapidated Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, for the hour of vespers."

"At four o'clock, from the sky came the strains of exquisite music, as though all the Angels of Paradise were descending to the earth. Soon — high above the church spires, a beautiful white cloud appeared. It darted forth vivid rays of light in every direction, amidst music from Heaven and a splendor that obscured the sun. Gradually it descended and rested upon the further portion of the unfinished wall of the Chapel, which had not been completed because of lack of funds."

"SUDDENLY THE bells of every Church in the village rang out, although no human hands had touched them. The cloud cleared away and a most beautiful object revealed. It was an image of Our Lady, holding her Divine Son in her arms. The picture or fresco remains in the same position as that in which it settled itself on the wall, almost five hundred years ago. Its sole support is a thin sheet of common plaster not much thicker than paper. It is untouched by time with its colors preserved intact."

"Its origin — if it had an earthly origin, is lost in the mists of time, but the cry of the multitude on that day in 1467, has echoed down through the ages in an efficacious appeal to the Mother of God — Live Mary, Our Mother of Good Counsel!"

Workshop Held For Nursing Students

A workshop for senior nursing students was held in the Dunn Memorial Nurses' Residence April 24. The program was sponsored by Area 11, New York State Student Nurses' Association, to present to senior nurses of the area the various types of positions open to them following graduation.

Over 100 senior nurses from Arnot Ogdan Memorial Hospital, St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, Alfred University and St. Joseph's participated.

Registration was at 3:30 p.m. and the keynote speaker was Esther M. Thompson, dean of the Division of Nursing, University of Rochester, and president of the New York State Nurses' Association. Miss Thompson pointed out that a profession is self-directing. It has leaders to make it grow.

THE SPEAKER urged the students to continue their professional growth and development after graduation. She said that there are many opportunities in nursing today and that the demand is nationwide. The speaker told the group that there are 430,000 nurses in active practice in the United States today and that population trends will increase the need to 700,000 by 1970.

Miss Thompson stated that over half of the nursing personnel in this country today are practical nurses and nursing aides. Because of this situation, she pointed out that professional nurses must be well prepared to guide the auxiliary personnel in order to assure good nursing care for patients.

A PANEL on careers in nursing was next on the program. Mrs. Margaret Giles represented the school-nurse teacher; Bea-

trice Lawton, the industrial nurse; Wanda Hamlin, the physician's office nurse and Lorraine Tamblin, the nurse educator. Sister Marie Michael, educational director at St. Joseph's moderated the panel.

Dinner was served to the group on the ninth floor of the Nurses' Residence.

A special feature of the program following the dinner was a fashion show of latest styles in graduate nurses' uniforms. Alfred University students were models and the commentator was Sylvia Travis of Sheehan's Inc. Department Store. A uniform was awarded as a door prize by Sheehan's to Miss Wood, Arnot Ogdan senior.

THE PROGRAM was concluded with a panel on nursing in the armed services. The panelists were Lt. Cmdr. Dorothy Eaton, Navy Nurse of Buffalo and Capt. Elizabeth Blomer, Army Nurse

of Rochester. The requirements, qualifications, duties and opportunities for nurses in military service were outlined by the panelists.

Shirley Sisolak and Dominica Plutina were general chairmen of the workshop. Arrangements were in charge of senior students at St. Joseph's, Carol Bailey, Sonja Fortner and Alice Tolmie of the Arnot Ogdan arranged for speakers. Fashion show committee was made up of Alfred University students, and the exhibits were arranged by Mary Handley and Sharon Smith of St. James Mercy Hospital.

Churches Slate Evening Masses

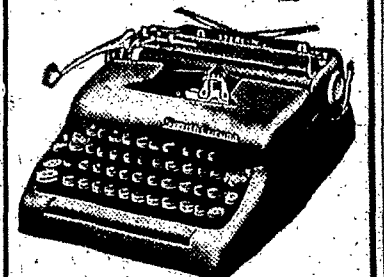
Two Elmira churches have scheduled evening Masses during May.

Our Lady of Lourdes Church will have an evening Mass each week day at 5:30 p.m.



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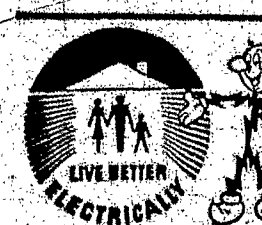
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
