Fund Pledges Top Goal By \$50,000

Horseheads—Construction of the first parochial school in this area became a virtual certainty when parishioners of St. Mary's parish this week pledged a total of more than \$150,000 toward the project.

Rev. Francis J. Reilly, pastor, termed the campaign for pledges "a tremendous success." Total subscriptions were more than \$50,000 over the \$100,000 minimum goal.

Father Reilly said construction may begin next Autumn, with completion scheduled by September, 1959. The building will contain eight classrooms and an auditorium-gymnasium seating 600.

Nearly 200 men who conducted the parishwide canvass attended a kickoff dinner last Saturday in the Horseheads Central School cafeteria. Principal speaker was His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey.

BISHOP CASEY stressed the importance of a parochial school to a parish, and declared:

"A major function of education is to teach children to know, love and serve God. Education without religion lacks one leg."

Rev. Joseph G. Merkel, pastor of St. Charles Borromeo Church, Elmira Heights, told the men that they were doing "one of the most important things in your lives."

Miss Frances Hoffman is chairman of the committee completing arrangements. Coffee will be served to the parents attending the breakfast.

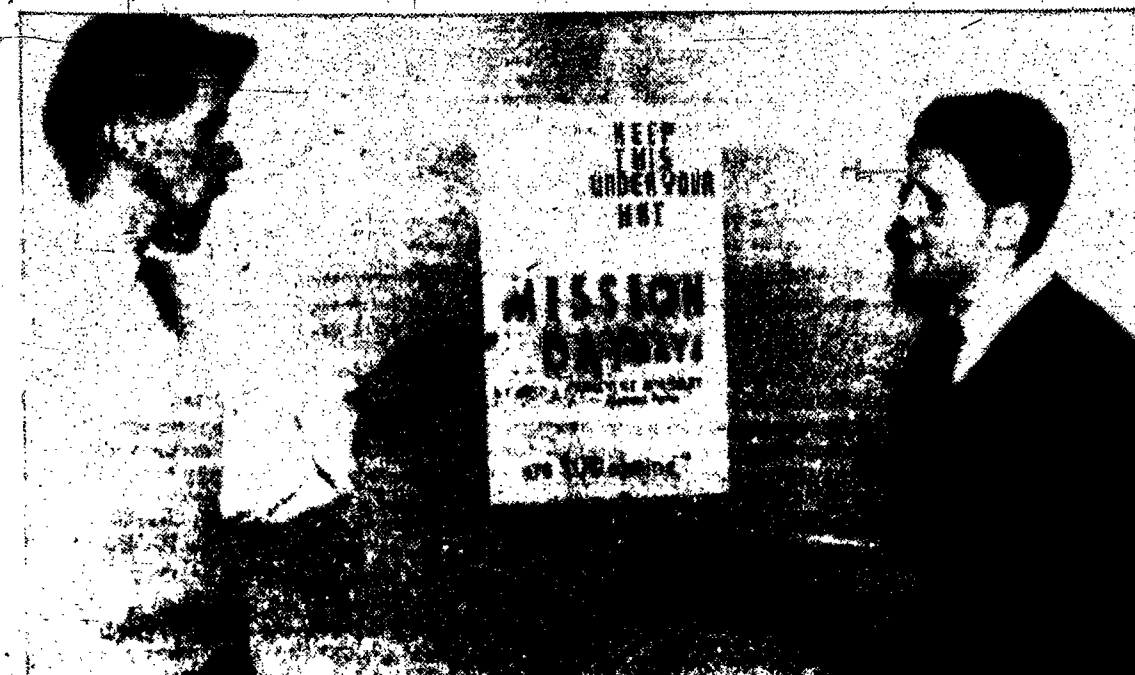
The children of St. Margaret Mary's Parish, Apalachin, will receive First Holy Communion, Sunday morning, May 4, at the 8 o'clock Mass.

Priest, Lawyer Give Second Of Pre-Cana Talks

Ithaca — Church Law And Marriage and Civil Law And Marriage were the topics last Monday for the second talk in the series of Pre-Cana Talks for engaged and recently married couples given in the Immaculate Conception School.

Rev. William M. Thomas speaking on Church Law, stated that God's Law governs all marriages, and that the law of the Catholic Church governs some marriages those involving baptized persons

and those in which only one partner is Catholic.

FATHER THOMAS outlined the conditions to be met before a marriage, for the ceremony, and after the ceremony.

A Catholic marriage is contracted in the presence of a priest and two witnesses usually followed by a Nuptial Mass, when both parties are Catholic, during which the couple receive the church's blessing. Father Thomas summarized by stating that marriage is for a lifetime, is exclusive—demanding absolute fidelity from both.

LEO GANGL, attorney, spoke on Civil Law And Marriage. He listed the legal requirements for marriage of a license, physical examination, and minimum age of 21 for the man and 18 for the woman. Civil impediments were also outlined such as blood relationships, affinity, crimes.

Gangl stated that a man is duty bound to support his wife and children and this is a duty that can never be excused. He also told about wills and how important it was for a family to draw one up as soon as possible especially when the welfare of children was involved.
