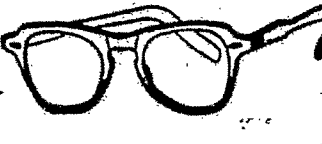

Health First Meeting**

MODERATOR for the panel discussion was Robert Barrie of Yorkers, executive director of the New York State Society for Mental Health.

The panel speakers were Sister Mary Scholastica, administrator of St. James Mercy Hospital; Hornell City Judge Mary Karr Jackson; Rev. David Sweet, Episcopal minister of Painted Post; Mrs. Helen Geckle, case supervisor of child welfare in the Steuben County Welfare department; Norman J. Vang, director of industrial relations at Corning Glass Works; Stanley Smith, vice-principal of Hammondport Central School; Thomas McHenry of Corning, first vice-president of the association; Dr. Paul Wonger, chief psychiatrist at the Bath Veterans Center, and Durand Weale, instructor of vocational agriculture at Addison Central School.

**Mgr. Gannon Addresses
First Saturday Group**

Hornell—"Christ, Who loved men enough to die for them, gave to mankind, just before His death, His most precious possession — His Blessed Mother," Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence W. Gannon, V.F., told a First Saturday luncheon group.

Msgr. Gannon, spiritual director of the Steuben Diocese, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, was principal speaker at the final luncheon of the season Saturday in the New Hotel Sherwood. The luncheons have been sponsored by the deanery on the first Saturday of each month in honor of Our Lady of Fatima. There were 50 women present.

"THE WORLD had stripped Christ of His beauty; His power to move among men; His life blood. Yet, out of burning love for us, He gave to the world someone He had saved for His own until the very last — His Mother — when he said, 'Son, Behold Thy Mother' and 'Mother, Behold Thy Son.'"

"By that mutual acceptance of Mary's taking all mankind as her children and men's acceptance of Mary as their mother the children of all the ages will, as did Jesus, advance in wisdom and grace," Msgr. Gannon said.

"Just as Mary gave Christ to the world, so should we. We cannot give what we have not, so we must first possess Christ spiritually, as Mary did, by living lives of holiness, prayer and resignation to the divine Will of God.

"Mary also is our model for protecting Christ from the world. What courage, love and belief in His divinity she showed at His passion when He was forsaken by the world! There is need for defense of Christ today, let He be crucified again. The indications are only too clear in some of our entertainment and literary today, which flagrantly flaunt Christ and His ideals.

"With Mary, our Mother — as our model, we can answer the plea of her dying Son, by giving Christ to the world, yet preserving Him from it," Msgr. Gannon concluded.

Josephine FitzGerald, deanery president, presided at the luncheon. Arrangements were in charge of Mrs. Herman Hoffman, Mrs. Humbert Solo and a large committee. Elizabeth and Armella Brill were in charge of decorations.
