Sister Bernard Honored In Geneva At Her Diamond Jubilee As Nun

Geneva—A reception honoring Sister Bernard on her diamond jubilee was held Sunday from 3 to 5 p.m. in St. Stephen's School hall, when hundreds of her former pupils gathered to greet her and present her a check for \$2,000, so that she may visit her homeland.

Sister Bernard came to the United States from Germany in 1887, when she was 15 years old. She entered the order of the Sisters of St. Joseph in that year. Her first assignment was at St. Francis Xavier in Rochester. Later she taught in Auburn and Webster.

She came to Geneva in Sept., 1917, where she was a member of the faculty of De Sales High School for 40 years.

Former pupils from all walks of life streamed into St. Stephen's hall on Sunday to express their congratulations and good wishes to their teacher.

THEIR GIFT, a check for \$2,000, was presented to Sister Bernard by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Ball, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, and former principal of De Sales High School.

Additional contributions for the fund are still being received, according to a committee report. District Attorney M. Maurice Church of Geneva, one of Sister's former pupils, was toastmaster for the program which followed the reception.

Committee on arrangements for the event included Frances Merriman, Mrs. Charles D. Bowman and Chacelia.

MONSIGNOR BALL and Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen's parish, both former principals of De Sales High School, lauded Sister's loyalty and devotion to duty, not only in the field of teaching, but also in administrative work for the school system. Monsignor Ball described her as "one of the greatest teachers I have ever known."

Known as a splendid disciplinarian, Sister had the love and respect of her pupils. They knew that her deepest concern was for their welfare. She was interested in making them more than "average" pupils, and inspired them to do their very best.

Sister Bernard is currently at Nazareth Academy, Rochester. She enjoys helping in the library, or supplies when teachers are absent. Except for a few years of illness, she has been quite active and still keeps busy and continues to maintain a lively interest in all school activities.
