Bishop To Raise 9 To Priesthood

Seven Of New Priests For Rochester Diocese

Nine young men will be ordained to the Holy Priesthood by Bishop Kearney on Saturday, May 31 at ceremonies starting at 9 a.m. in the Sacred Heart Cathedral. The ordination day also marks the Feast of the Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Seven of the new priests, all St. Bernard's Seminary graduates, will be ordained for service in the Rochester Diocese. Two will serve in other dioceses.

Besides the seven to be ordained for the Diocese of Rochester, 22 additional members of St. Bernard's Seminary 1958 Ordination Class will serve in the Hartford archdiocese and 6 other dioceses in 4 states.

All of the new priests of the Rochester Diocese will celebrate their first solemn Masses in their respective parish churches on Sunday, June 1.

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, told twenty-three first-year nursing students to follow the motherly example of their own mothers and the Blessed Virgin in their careers as nurses at traditional capping services held last Sunday at the Nazareth College campus.

Citing the significance of Mother's Day, Bishop Kearney told the students that they should imitate Our Lady in her devotion to duty. "Your nursing career should be marked by the same steadfastness that Our Lady showed in her attention to the veiling of the Divine Saviour," the Bishop said.

THE BISHOP also told the young women that they should follow the example of their own mothers and use these qualities in carrying out the duties of their profession.

Navy Bars Holy Medals In 'Moons'

Washington, D.C. (RNS)—The Navy Department said here that steps have been taken to prevent attachment of religious medals to Vanguard missiles or satellites in the future.

Rear Adm. D. C. Varian, director of personnel policy for the Navy, has advised Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State that "the attachment to a Vanguard rocket of a St. Christopher medal was done without the sanction of the Navy."

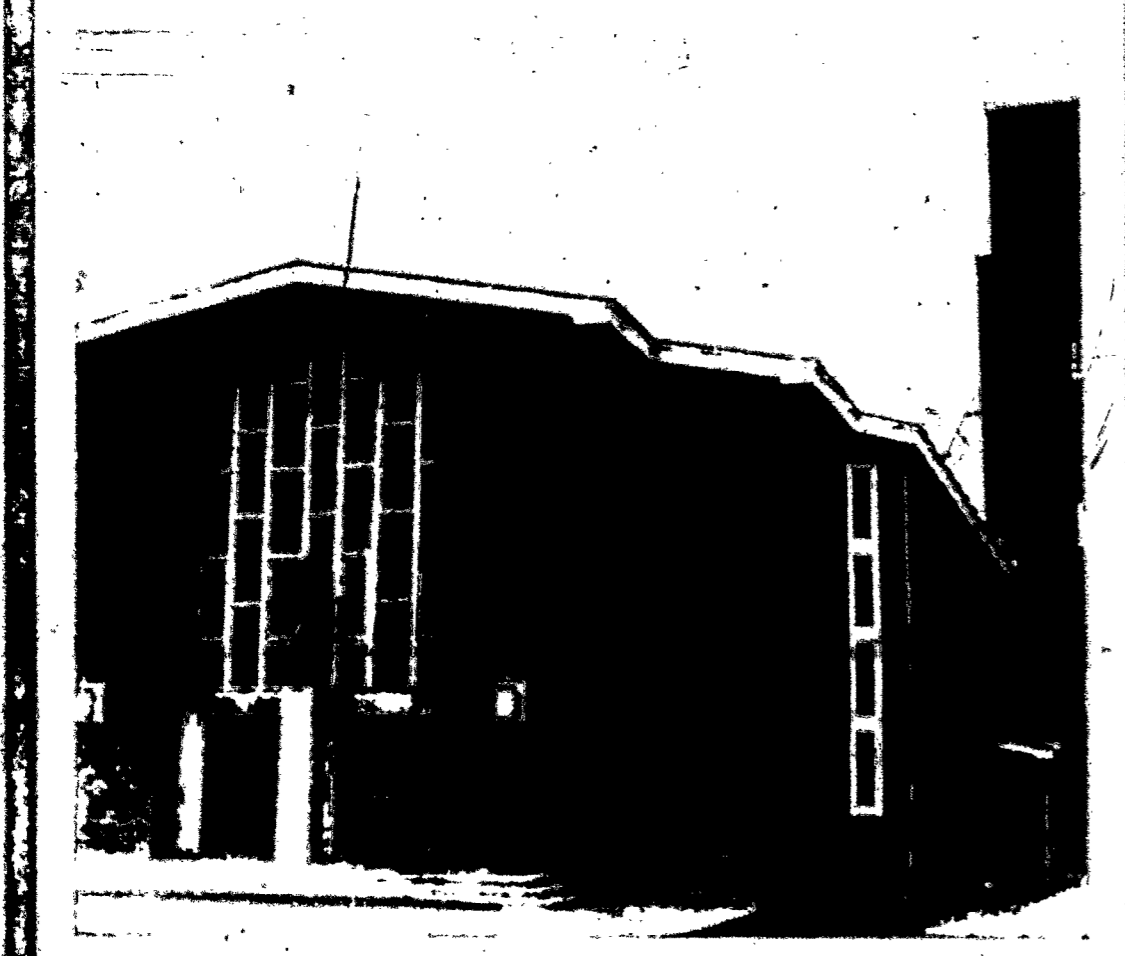
"Shortly after this occurred and before the receipt of comment from the public, steps were taken by the Navy to prevent future similar departures from the universal scientific nature of the Vanguard project," Adm. Varian said.

He made the disclosure in a letter to POAU replying to its protest against attachment of the religious medal to the rocket. POAU asked the Navy to state its policy with regard to such "sectarian projects."

Adm. Varian said that he was replying at the direction of Secretary of Defense Neil H. McElroy.

The St. Christopher medal was attached to the second stage of the three-stage rocket which is the only class fired by the Navy that succeeded in putting a satellite into orbit around the earth.

Pittsford Church Rites Slated

Climaxing of a three-year expansion program at St. Louis Parish, Pittsford, will take place next Wednesday evening (May 21) when His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will formally bless the newly constructed parish church.

The blessing rite will begin at 6 p.m., followed by celebration of Low Mass.

The new edifice, located on South Main St., between Monroe Ave. and Route 96 in the rapidly expanding village south-east of Rochester, is the second structure to be completed since Father John A. Reddington became pastor in 1953.

The first was the modern grammar school, adjacent to the church, which was finished in 1956 at a cost of \$230,000.

Following the blessing of the new church next Wednesday evening, Bishop Kearney will celebrate the Low Mass. The sermon will be preached by His Excellency, Bishop John J. Wright of Worcester, Mass. A student at the North American College in Rome with Father Reddington, Bishop Wright has a brother, Robert G. Wright, in St. Louis Parish.

Bishop Kearney will be assisted at the blessing by more than 100 priests. The children's choir will sing at the Mass.

After the Mass, Bishop Kearney and Bishop Wright, as well as the members of the clergy, will attend a parish dinner in the former church structure on State St., which has since been converted into a parish hall and gymnasium by the men of the parish.

THE CHURCH was designed by architect J. Sanford Shanley of New York. It was built at a cost of \$775,000 by the general contracting firm of F. Gleason Co.

Father Dougherty Funeral Monday In Clifton Springs

Solemn funeral Mass will be offered for Rev. Emmett T. Dougherty, pastor of St. Felix Church, Clifton Springs, Monday, May 19 at 10:30 a.m.

Bishop Kearney will celebrate the Mass and impart the final absolution in the Clifton Springs church.

Priests of the Diocese will chant Office of the Dead for Father Dougherty in the Clifton Springs church Sunday at 8 p.m.

FATHER DOUGHERTY, twelve years pastor of St. Felix Church, died early Thursday morning, May 15, 1958. He had been in failing health for the past five years but continued to fulfill his pastoral duties.

The sixty-two year old priest was found dead in bed as parishioners were assembling for Ascension Thursday holy day Mass.

He was well known as a forceful speaker and was frequently in demand to address civic as well as religious groups. He was also a talented violinist.

ORDAINED June 10, 1922, Father Dougherty was first assigned as assistant pastor of St. Monica's Church, Rochester. He served as chaplain at Sonyea's Craig Colony and as administrator of St. Patrick's Church, Victor.

In 1933 he was named chaplain at St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester and the following year became pastor of Epiphany Church, Solus. He was transferred to be pastor of St. Bernard's Church, Scipio Center, and to St. Patrick's Church, Moravia, in 1940.

He was named to the Clifton Springs parish in 1946.
