It was announced that the participants for the Month of May Family Rosary Program over Radio Station WTKG for May 31st would be society members.

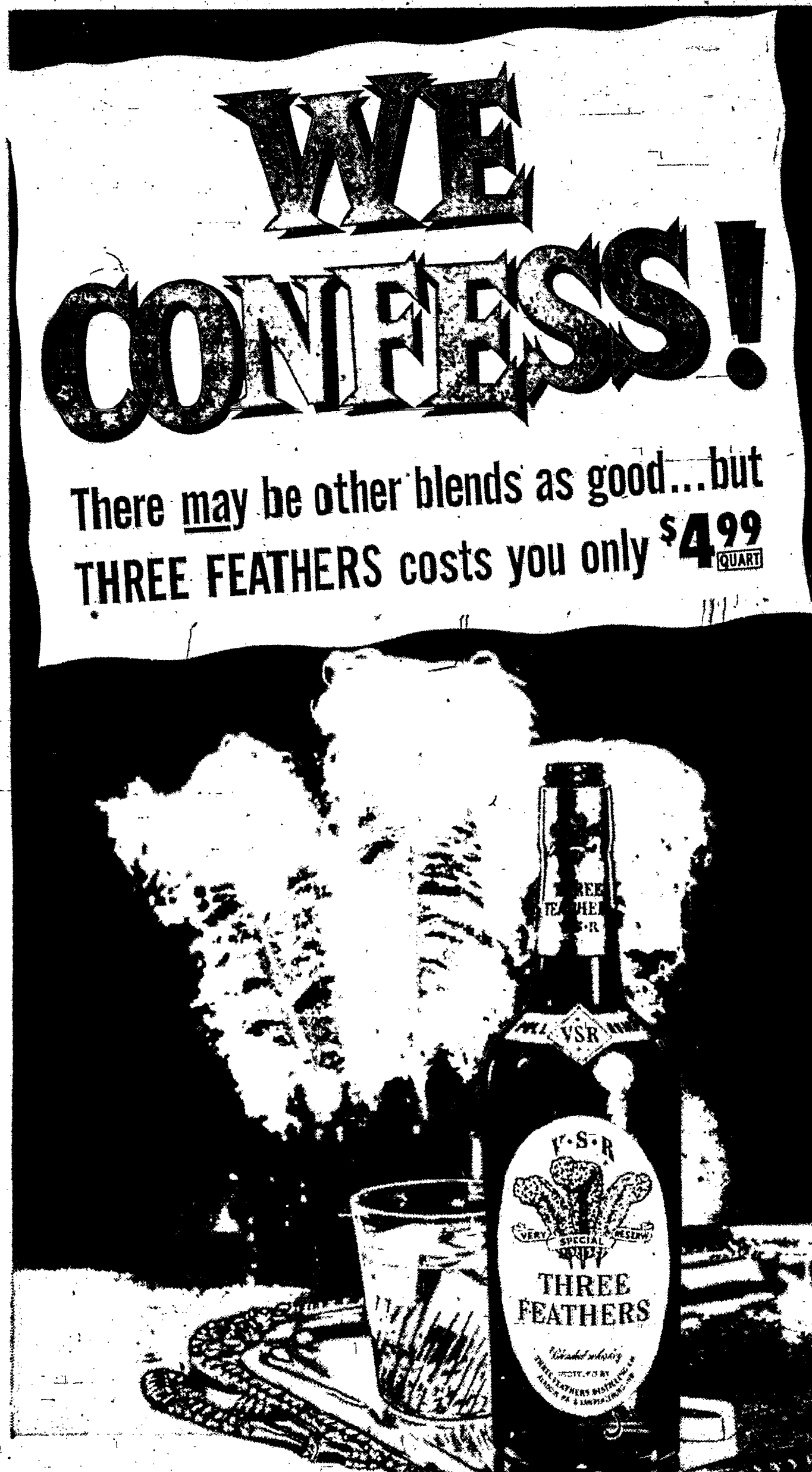
was not an overnight accomplishment but the result of a great deal of thinking and a real effort to dig deep into the truths that Catholics take for granted.
