### Examination Center For Board Program

Auburn — Under the advanced placement program, Mt. Carmel High School has been a center for examinations during the current week when tests were administered in English composition, American history, mathematics, chemistry and European history.

These tests are given by the College Entrance Board in the interest of able students of secondary schools to enable these students to undertake work commensurate with their abilities, and in the interest of colleges which welcome freshmen who are ready for advanced courses.

Only the college which the candidate for credit and advanced placement is entering receives the advanced placement material. Many colleges give both credit and placement to students who perform satisfactorily in college-level courses in school and on the advanced placement examination.

Part of the program is to develop communication between school and college teachers and administrators and to improve articulation of work done in school and college. Accordingly, nine conferences were held in late June 1957. In the early part of the summer of 1958 members of the Mt. Carmel High School faculty will attend workshops in the program at Northwestern University and DePaul University.

The scholarship examination will be administered on Saturday, May 23 at 9:30 a.m. at the school. Two Mt. Carmel four scholarships are awarded annually to the boy and the girl with the highest scores on the test.

Maurin and Miss Day founded the first House of Hospitality in New York in early depression years. Through their inspiration the Rochester hospitality house was opened 19 years ago, and has been dispensing free meals and clothing daily to less fortunate men since that time.

The group which conducts the house meets regularly for open meetings and discussions every Tuesday night.

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
