

# 3 New Priests Slate First Masses

Three young men of Rochester will be ordained priests in separate ceremonies Saturday, May 31.

Rev. Raymon C. Gugel, Rev. Charles G. Lenhard and Rev. Lawrence V. Palumbos will serve in the dioceses of Albany, N. Y., Steubenville and Columbus, Ohio.

ALL THREE will celebrate their first solemn Masses in Rochester churches Sunday, June 8.

Details of the scheduled first Masses and biographical data of the newly ordained priests follow:

Rev. Raymon C. Gugel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond P. Gugel, 375 Seneca Parkway, will celebrate his first solemn Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Sunday, June 8, at 11 a.m.

Assisting him will be Rev. Bernard Slegie, T.O.R., assistant priest; Rev. Joseph Reinhart, deacon; and Rev. Philip Bayon, subdeacon. Rev. James Marini will preach the sermon.

Father Gugel attended St. Monica's school, Rochester, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries.

During the Korean war he served in the U.S. Navy and then completed his theological studies at St. Francis Seminary, Leno, Penn.

He will be ordained by Bishop John K. Muesio in Holy Name Cathedral, Steubenville, Ohio, Saturday, May 31. He will return to serve in the Steubenville diocese after his June 8 Mass in Rochester.

A reception will be held at his home, 375 Seneca Parkway, Sunday, June 8, 4 to 6:30 p.m.

Rev. Charles G. Lenhard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert W. Lenhard, 104 Tottenham Rd., will offer his first solemn Mass in St. Ambrose Church, Sunday, June 8, at 11 a.m.

He will be assisted by Rev. Edwin B. Metzger, assistant priest; Rev. James J. O'Hanlon, deacon; and Rev. Raymond J. Carter, subdeacon. Rev. John P. McCormick, S.S., will give the sermon.

Father Lenhard attended elementary schools in Ohio, St. Nicholas High School, Zanesville, O.; St. Charles Borromeo college and seminary, Columbus, O.; Catholic University, Washington, D. C.; and the University of Rochester.

He will be ordained by Bishop Clarence J. Issenmann in St. Joseph's Cathedral, Columbus, Saturday, May 31, and will later serve in that diocese.

Following Father Lenhard's first Mass at St. Ambrose Church, Rochester, a reception will be held in the parish hall, 3 to 6 p.m.

Rev. Lawrence V. Palumbos, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Palumbos, 144 Lewis St., will offer his first solemn Mass in Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, Sunday, June 8, at 11 a.m.

Assistant priest will be Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Azzi, Rev. William Cosgrove will be deacon and Rev. Leo Riefer, subdeacon. Rev. Richard Orlando will preach the sermon.

Father Palumbos attended Our Lady of Mt. Carmel school, Edison Technical High School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries, Rochester, and Christ the King Seminary at St. Bonaventure, N. Y.

He will be ordained by Bishop William A. Scully in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, Albany, N. Y., May 31, at 9 a.m. Father Palumbos will serve in the Albany diocese.

Father John Kenny, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Kenny of East Rochester, celebrated his first solemn Mass in the Church of St. Paul the Apostle in New York City.

Father Kenny, a Paulist Father, also celebrated a solemn Mass at St. Jerome's Church, East Rochester, last Sunday, after which a dinner was held in his honor, followed by a party reception in the church hall.

While studying in St. Paul's College, Washington, D. C., the Paulist Father became secretary of the Paulist Fraternity, which distributed religious articles to over 500 newspapers.

## Pittsford Church Dedicated

Pittsford's new St. Louis Church was formally dedicated Wednesday evening of this week.

Bishop Kearney said the prayers of the blessing ritual and then celebrated Mass at 8 p.m. to climax the suburban parish's three year expansion program.

Bishop John L. Wright of Wat-

erloo, Mass., gave the sermon to the dedication Mass.

"There have been vast changes in the world of politics and science since the days of thirteenth century King St. Louis, patron of this parish," Bishop Wright said, "but the Catholic faith cherished has remained constant, unchanging from his day to ours."

The Worcester prelate said the zeal of the crusader king should

inspire 20th century Catholics to "faithfully and devoutly observe of the gospel of Jesus Christ" by following in the example given us by the hero St. Louis.

## Registration Set For Reading Laboratory By Sisters Of Mercy

Registration for the summer session of the Reading Laboratory conducted by the Sisters of Mercy of Catherine McAuley Junior College begins today, May 23, for students who wish to attend the branch laboratory at Holy Cross School, 4488 Lake Ave.

Other students may register at the laboratory headquarters at Our Lady of Mercy High School on June 13 and 14. A parent is expected to make the registration.

Students from second grade through college from any school, public or private, may enroll. Classes are conducted in groups of seven, an hour a day, July 1 through July 25. Each student must attend the 20 classes. The

classes open in St. Michael's, Newark, June 7 and Holy Family, Auburn, June 9.

A TESTING program will provide diagnostic analysis to assist in group placement and to insure the needs of individual students being met. Test results will be interpreted to parents through written reports and guidance interviews.

Personality testing will be included in the test battery, since personality factors influence reading achievement almost as much as does intelligence, according to Sister Mary de Pazzi, director of the Reading Laboratory since its opening in 1951.

The latest equipment and materials, including audio-visual media, are employed in the remedial program. Special library facilities with guidance in book selection appropriate to individual appointment, Stanford-Binet or Wechsler I.Q. achievement testing in all areas, vocational aptitude testing, including tests

of music and an aptitude manual dexterity, etc., are regular test offerings.

A full-time speech therapist will be available at Catherine McAuley Junior College for students whose speech requires attention; hours may be arranged at the time of registration. Tutoring in the various subject fields is offered there, too.
