His Excellency Bishop Kearney presided at the Solemn Funeral Mass of Helen Ward, a private duty nurse at St. Mary Hospital for 50 years, Saturday, May 17 at St. Augustine Church.

Miss Ward, 31 Woodbine Ave., died May 12, 1958 in Salt Lake City, Utah where she was stricken by illness while on a trip with her sister Miss Mary Ward, president of Rochester Women's Bowling Association.

Bishop Kearney imparted absolution at the Mass and spoke of Miss Ward's outstanding record as a nurse. Her many thoughtful and kindly services for patients, priests, Sisters, and fellow nurses at St. Mary's during half a century were cited.

The Bishop traced Miss Ward's career from the time in 1907 when she began as a probationer to her most recent services which included assisting in caring for the Bishop when a patient at the hospital.
