Commencement exercises for St. Andrew's Seminary will take place Friday, June 6, at 3:00 p.m. in the seminary auditorium.

A heroic Syracuse priest drowned Sunday in a vain attempt to save a 9 year old child caught in the rolling surf off a crowded Texas beach.

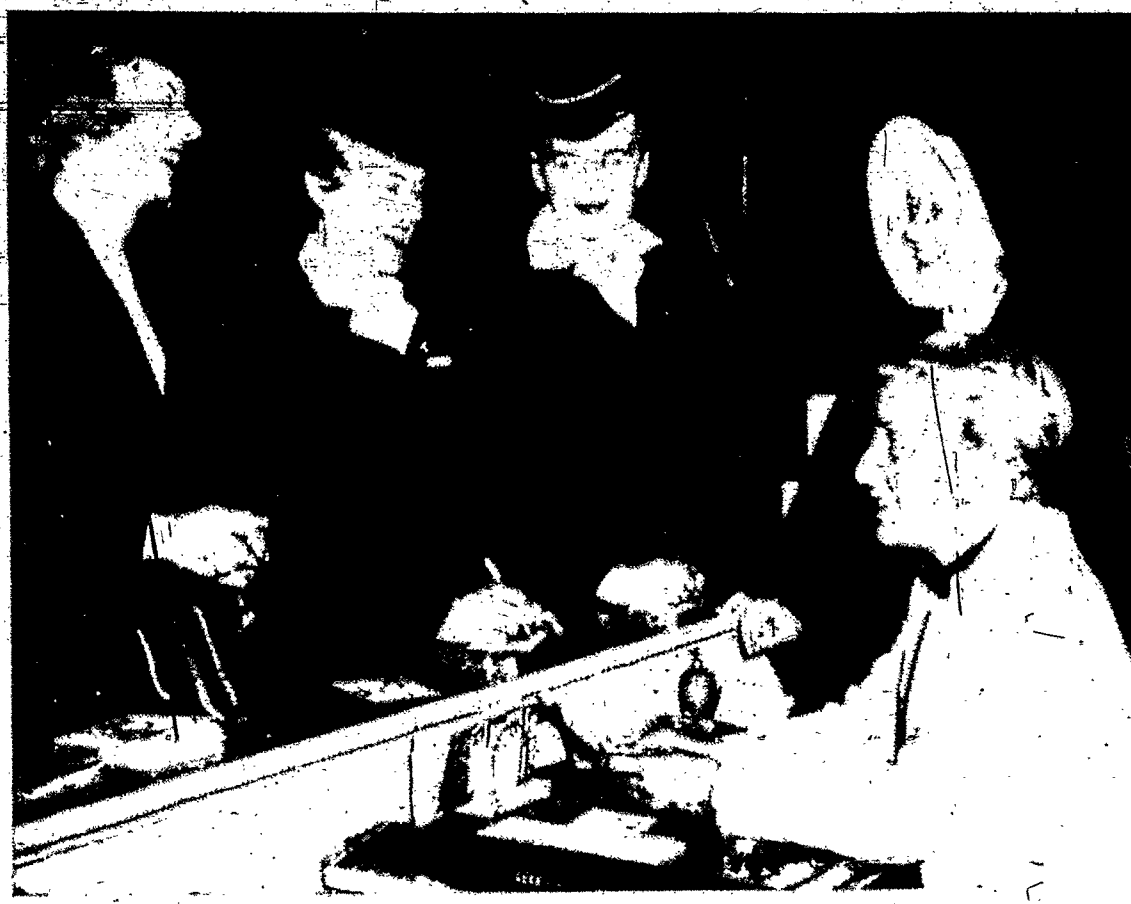
REV. LEONARD M. BARRY, 40, an Air Force chaplain with the rank of captain, was visiting friends at Foster Air Force Base, Texas, prior to taking up new duties in Bermuda.

He is a graduate of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, and was ordained by Bishop Walter A. Foery in the Syracuse cathedral in 1946.

Parishioners Build Their Own Church

Living, La. — (NC) — One parishioner of St. Anthony's mission here has contributed more than \$10,000 in gifts, materials and time to construction of a new \$65,000 chapel.

The chapel will be dedicated June 1 by Archbishop Joseph E. Rummel of New Orleans.

The largest part of expenses for the new chapel was donated by Louis A. Badalamenti, local real estate dealer and plantation owner. Inspired by his example, other parishioners have helped out. One painted the entire church and another has done all the electrical work.

The new building, seating 500, replaces a chapel which held 175. St. Anthony's founded in 1900, is a mission of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary parish in Taft, La.

Presbyterians To Kneel 25 Years From Now

Invercargill, New Zealand — (RNS) — Presbyterian congregations will return to the custom of kneeling for prayer within 25 years, the moderator of the Presbyterian Church in New Zealand predicted.

The Rt. Rev. R. G. McDowall told a gathering of Southland Province Presbyterians that members of his church should learn to say "Amen" at the end of prayers, and learn more prayers by heart.

He deplored the absence of room between church pews for worshippers to kneel. "Public worship, as we conduct it is far too much a one-man affair," he said. "The congregation does nothing but listen to the minister."

Rumanian Bishops Reported Under Police Surveillance

Vienna — (NC) — Bishop Aaron Marton of Alba Julia, believed to be the only Catholic prelate still at liberty in communist Rumania, has been placed under strict police surveillance, according to reports received here.

Reports state that the 61-year-old Bishop has been forbidden to perform any religious or pastoral duties that are not strictly liturgical and do not take place either in his own residence or in the cathedral.

Orphans Need Love, Says Holy Father

Vatican City — (NC) — "More than food and clothing the orphan needs the intimate warmth of kindness and the certainty that the future holds something better for him than the unhappy present," His Holiness Pope Pius XII said here.

SPEAKING TO an audience of the National Organization of the Care of Orphans of Italian Workers, the Pontiff urged his hearers to "love the children entrusted to you by God, by families, and by country."

"Love them out of gratitude for the sacrifice offered by their parents to the nation and with the wish to change their misfortune into a source of happiness."

"Love them with that religious sense taught from the beginning by the Apostle, St. James, who showed that the important part of Christianity lay in help given to orphans:

"Religion pure and undefiled before God the Father, is this: to give aid to orphans and widows to their tribulation and to keep one's self unstained from the world." (James 1:27)

"LOVE ORPHANS because they are loved much by the Church and She will be grateful to you for the love you give them," he said.

The Pope also addressed himself to the orphans present, saying: "You will always be the Pope's special children. In keeping with the tradition of the Church which has always devoted herself to rational care of orphans, He (the Pope) considers himself your father in a special way."

Hospital Says Paul 'On House'

Cedar Rapids, Iowa — (NC) — Mercy Hospital here tore up the bill when young Paul Balls was born.

Paul was the 16th child born to Mr. and Mrs. John R. Balls and the 14th of the Balls' children to be born at Mercy Hospital. The hospital promptly informed his parents that young Paul was "on the house." The Balls now have eight sons and eight daughters.

Hong Kong Prelate Asks Prayers For China Catholics

Hong Kong — (NC) — Bishop Lawrence Bianchi of Hong Kong has praised the firmness of Catholics in the face of unrelenting persecution in communist China, and ordered prayers for those who might waver in their faith under the tremendous pressure.

In a pastoral letter read in the 87 Catholic churches of the British colony, he said:

"It is the intensive and sustained effort of the communist government of China to force the bishops and priests of that great country to break their allegiance to the Holy See; establish a schismatic church, and submit themselves in religious as well in all other matters to the authority of rulers who are themselves without the vestige of religious belief, and who have declared themselves the enemy of all religion."

Bishop Bianchi mentioned thousands of missionaries expelled after the lapse of a papal "la tuita" and the many schools expatriated by the government.

"Most of all, the Chinese and hospitals closed down and clergy and lay Catholics have been and continue to be compelled to attend indoctrination courses which involve the most intense mental torture, and whose sole purpose is to crush help, spirit and love from us, to accept the communist doctrine and principles even in religious matters."

But the Chinese Catholics, he said, the whole resisted the violence and intense pressure with admirable fortitude and their sufferings and resistance have added most moving and glorious pages to the history of the Church," he said.

BISHOP BIANCHI expressed much concern for the few who are inclined to give in, and referred to reports of the illicit consecration of two bishops recently in Harbin.

The Hong Kong episcopate was urged to pray not only for the Catholics in China, but also for those who persecute the Church of God so that they may understand that God cannot be defied with impunity."

600 Baptized In 6 Hour Rite

Taichung, Formosa — In one of the largest baptismal ceremonies ever witnessed on Formosa, over 600 aborigines were received into the Church in the mountains near here.

Led by Father Henry L. Faucher, Maryknoll Missioner from Pawtucket, R.I., pastor of the remote mission there, the ceremony, lasting six hours, required five priests to complete.

The ceremony climaxed long months of hard work by the Rhode Island missionaries. Roads into the mountains are few and dangerous, with most of the traveling on foot.

But on results have been gratifying, says Father Faucher. "Thousands of these aborigines who were head-hunters only 80 years ago — have been brought into the Church within the last five years."

Applicants Swamp Hong Kong School

Hong Kong — (NC) — The great need for more schools for Hong Kong youngsters was made evident when hundreds of parents lined up in the cathedral compound to try to get their children into the new Rainaldi College here.

The parents queued up as early as 6 o'clock in the morning, some three hours before the staff of the Hong Kong diocesan school started to hand out registration forms.

In about three quarters of an hour, more than 300 forms were distributed after brief interviews. Registration will continue for a month.
